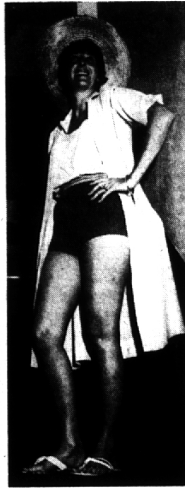

She invited Mrs. Eldh to accompany her and Mrs. Eldh accepted.

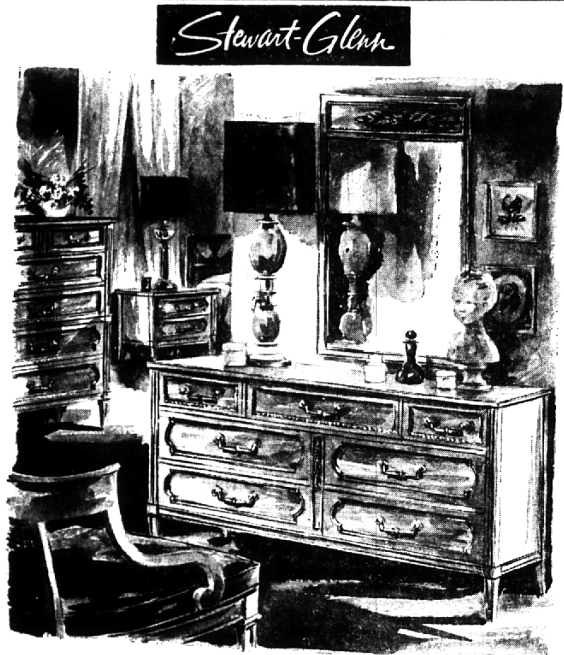

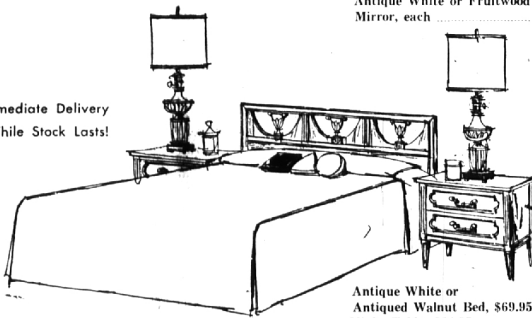
