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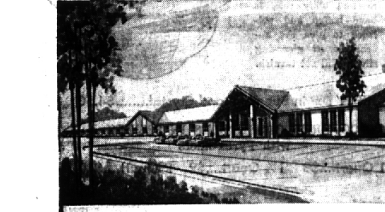

Fee Merriam, author, poet, and television personality, will be the guest speaker at a conference for women titled "Once A College Woman - What Now?" to be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday in the Rackham Educational Memorial, Detroit.

The Women of Wayne State University Alumni and the University Center for Adult Education (Wayne State University, The University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University) are co-sponsors of the conference planned to help guide and direct the woman who wants to make greater use of her talents outside the home.

Through her extensive writing and television appearances, Miss Merriam has become a social critic of the American scene. Her recent book, "After Nora Slammed the Door," questions the myths and attitudes that stifle the American woman in realizing her potential.

Mrs. Noonan has been named to her position as a provisional appointee pending approval by the State Civil Service Commission. She has been a public library consultant with the state library since 1948, in charge of state aid to public libraries and has been assistant director of the consultant division since 1957.

She replaces Louise Rees who has retired to teach at Bowling Green State University, O.

Prior to joining the state library, Mrs. Noonan was head librarian at Long Beach Public Library, Long Beach, N.Y. She has held positions at the Teachers College, Columbia University; Wayne County Library; and at Paterson Public Library, Paterson, New Jersey.

MRS. NOONAN has a library science degree from Syracuse University and an M.S. degree from Columbia University.

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Census Takers For Agriculture

Enumerators have been named in Oakland County for the 1964 census of agriculture, Crew Leader Lorenzo B. Perkins has announced.

Enumerators in Oakland County belong to a force of 23,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U.S. Bureau of the Census for this year's census of agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district to determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A CENSUS of agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U.S. economy.

Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures.
