Holly Scores 47-13 Romp Over B'field

Holly unleashed its powerful offense at Bloomfield Hills Friday and before the visitors had left for home, they had gained an awe-inspiring 461 yards and a 47-13 victory.

The Broncos turned loose half-backs Mark Phalen and Jim Starr and the two fleet-footed invaders ran circles around the Baron defense. Starr picked up two TD's while Phalen dazzled the homecoming crowd with five markers.

Holly scored the first two times they had the ball, driving 61 yards with the opening kickoff to pay-dirt. Phalen swept right end for the score. The second time they marched 61 yards and Starr did the honors, bucking in from the three.

Groves and Southfield moved out of their conferences over the week end and both schools were treated rather harshly.

Groves, facing Clintondale in Mt. Clemens, couldn't cope with the defense of the host school and came home with a 31-6 defeat.

Southfield didn't allow quite so many points scored against them in the second half with the help of some timely blocking. They marched 61 yards in the third period as Phalen went around right end for 11 yards to make it 27-6.

Phalen added three more touchdowns in the final quarter on runs of 32, one and six yards as the Hills could only get one back, on an electrifying 74-yard pass-run play.

BLOOMFIELD HAD the ball on their own 26, trailing 34-6. Carney pitched back to fullback Bill Barnes, who lifted a pass upfield to end Gary Flecher. The senior grabbed the ball, shook off the lone defender, and raced the rest of the way to score.

The loss dropped Bloomfield into a tie with West Bloomfield for fourth place, each with 3-4 marks in the Wayne-Oakland League. Holly finished second to Milford.

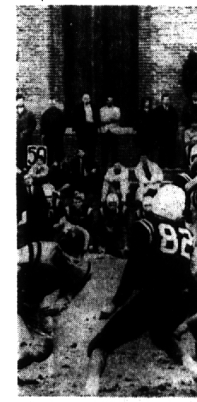
Olson Runs 2nd Fastest Two-Mile In Prep History

Jim Olson, a former Seaholm track and cross-country star, ran the second fastest two-mile in U.S. prep history last week for Kirkwood, Mo., High School.

Olson, who moved to Missouri from Birmingham last summer, set the Missouri state record earlier this year, clipping 23 seconds off the previous mark.

LAST WEDNESDAY he posted a two-mile time of 9:08.7, a mark bettered only by Gerry Lindgren of Spokane, Wash., who represented the United States in the Tokyo Olympics (10,000 meters).

Olson's clocking was faster than that set by Jim Dyan of Wichita, Kan., the first high school miler to break the four-minute mile mark. Dyan represented the U.S. in the 1500 meter in Tokyo.

Oaks Win, 13-6, In Last Seconds

It's been a frustrating season for Seaholm coach Carl Lemle and his Maples.

A few breaks, a few points, have decided the issue on more than one occasion and transformed a possible successful year into a so-so record.

But, if the narrow defeats to Hazel Park and Berkley and the last-minute tie with Kimball were disappointing, the shocker Friday night against Royal Oak Dondero was a heartbreaker.

The Oaks, who had tied Fernon earlier this season, went into a 6-0 lead but were held in check by the Maple defense until the closing seconds when, with the score knotted at 6-6, a desperation pass in the end zone gave Dondero the win on the last play from scrimmage.

It was a thrilling climax to a game that seemed to gain momentum as it progressed.

Both schools battled on even terms throughout a scoreless first half, with Dondero never getting beyond Seaholm's 40-yard line. The Maples made it to the Oaks' 16 in the second period, but a field goal attempt by Mike Lawrie was blocked.

In the third stanza, Dondero took over at their own 32 and went in to score. Aided by a personal foul penalty, they moved to the Maple 35, where quarterback Bob DeJulius lofted a pass to end Bob Sherwin, who raced into the end zone.

The Maples came right back. They drove from their own 32 to score in the opening minutes of the final quarter. Fullback Tom Marsh bulled over from the two with eight minutes left, but Lawrie's extra point attempt was off to left.

That set the stage for the grand finale. Neither team could move until Dondero began a final drive on the passing arm of DeJulius.

With a minute and a half left, he hit Dave Gouliat with a toss that netted 60 yards to the Maple 24. Seaholm's Rick Snyder smeared DeJulius for a loss but an 11-yard pass gave the Oaks a first down at Seaholm's 13 with 16 seconds left.

A first-down pass left incomplete but, with 11 seconds to go, DeJulius hit Sherwin on a hook-in

pass on the goal line and the big end fell across to provide the victory.

Both teams had 11 first downs and Seaholm's captain, Snyder, played an outstanding game on defense, red-dogging to throw DeJulius for losses throughout the contest.

The Maples face Madison Heights in their final game of the year tomorrow night. Maybe this time the breaks will go with Seaholm.

KIMBALL STATE CHAMPS

Maple Harriers Dethroned

Defending state cross-country champion Birmingham Seaholm turned in a creditable performance Saturday at the Washtenaw Country Club in Ypsilanti, but failed to repeat as this year's winners.

The Maples finished fourth behind victorious Royal Oak Kimball, Detroit Redford and Wyandotte with a total of 126 points. Kimball had 80, Redford 92 and Wyandotte 113.

Seaholm sorely missed Jim Olson, who moved to Missouri during the summer and has since set a new state mark in the two-mile

seventh or better in the state. No other school has equalled this.

Brian Moore of Cass Tech set a Class A record of 9:40.2 in winning the race, while Wyandotte placed second and third. Seaholm's Scott Bradley came in fourth. His time was approximately 10 seconds below that of last year's state champ, Jamie Dennis, a former Seaholm runner.

Mike Branic of Seaholm placed seventh, the best finish ever turned in by a Birmingham junior, topping Jim Olson's 13th place last year.

"IT WAS A VERY tough state meet. If we had Olson, I feel we could have won, but our team turned in a very creditable showing," said coach Kermit Ambrose. It marked the 11th year in a row that Seaholm has finished

runner in the first 10, but the Knights used balance, their specialty all year, to capture the state crown. Kimball runners finished 11th, 12th, 16th, 20th, 21st, 25th and 30th.

Seaholm's team total of 126 points was their third lowest in state competition. Last year they had 41 points, fewest in state meet history. The 1959 champions had 73 points.

Other schools finishing behind Seaholm were Ann Arbor, Milford, Muskegon Heights, Jackson Parkside, Kalamazoo Central, Midland, Mt. Clemens, Catholic Central and Grand Rapids Christian.

Cranbrook's three fall varsity athletic teams combined victories to make the past week end the most successful one during the 1964 season.

The football and soccer squads each scored wins over visiting Nichols, the first for each in five years against the outstate school.

The gridiron victory was one of the tightest games of the year for the Cranes and, thanks to the passing of quarterback Tom Van Horn and the kicking of specialist Mark Mayerstein, Cranbrook came away with a 10-8 win.

It made the Cranes the only area high school team to salvage a triumph over the week end.

Cranbrook started off strong. Early in the first quarter, Van Horn hit end captain Buzz Mieras with a 65-yard scoring pass. Mayerstein converted and Cranbrook led, 7-0.

But the lead was short-lived. Nichols, who had managed a 5-1 mark before the contest, came roaring right back.

They recovered a Crane fumble when Van Horn was hit trying to pass and a Cranbrook penalty gave Nichols a first down on the Crane 11. Several plays later, they drove in over tackle and then passed for two points and an 8-7 advantage.

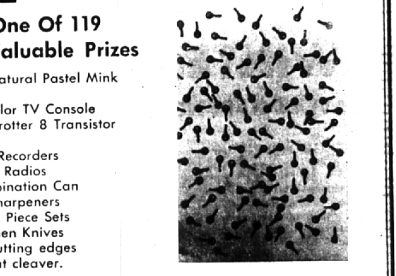
