

Army of Hunters Set For State's Whitetails

Saturday and Sunday will witness a migration north in Michigan that could surpass any in the state's history.

The explanation is simple — Michigan's deer season gets underway.

A half million hunters are expected to open the season Saturday in the western half of the Upper Peninsula and Sunday in the remainder of the state.

The army is likely to surpass the record-setting mark of last year that reached 515,000.

THE SEASON IN THE western half of the UP, where approximately one-fourth of the army will head, will run from Nov. 14-29, while the rest of Michigan will be open from Nov. 15-30.

The heaviest concentration of hunters is expected in the Roscommon County area of the north-
ern Lower Peninsula, where 37 hunters per square mile were located last year.

The region also yielded the highest deer kill in 1963, 4.3 bucks and just under four does per square mile.

Southern farm country, with its increasing deer herds, may provide other hunters with profitable short trips to the woods, providing local farmers consent.

IN FARM COUNTRY, hunters must use 22 rifles or shotguns with buckshot or slugs. In most northern communities, high-powered rifles are legal, while shotguns may be used throughout the state.

Bow hunters who tried unsuccessfully during their special season Oct. 1-Nov. 5, may purchase another license and try with either gun or bow.

Shooting hours around the state are from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m. Minors under 14 may not hunt during the rifle season, persons under 17 must be accompanied by an adult or guardian.

The Lake Shore Club in Milwaukee and the North Shore Club in Racine, Wis.

The group also proposes to build similar indoor tennis clubs in downtown Detroit and Grosse Pointe. Members of each club would have reciprocal privileges in the other two.

The new clubhouse will be constructed at a cost of more than \$250,000 and will be 120 ft. by 235 ft. in size, with a height of 40 ft. over the nets.

In addition to the four tennis courts, it will contain shower rooms for ladies and men, a sauna bath, private lockers, a lounge room complete with television and a children's play corner.

The building can be heated up to 85 degrees with infra-red gas heat and lighting will be equivalent to daylight.

PLANS ARE UNDERWAY to sponsor championship matches on the professional tennis circuit featuring such well-known stars as Pancho Gonzalez. The club also is planning to be the site of an annual indoor amateur tennis tournament for the metropolitan Detroit area.

Provisions have been made for installation of temporary seating facilities in the clubhouse to accommodate spectators at pro matches or amateur tournaments. Membership in the club will be limited to 400 and obtained on memberships can be held from Mrs. Buell, 1494 Buckingham, Birmingham.
