Winners were congratulated, losers put on smiles of "better luck next time," and East Hills Junior High was bare of all campaign slogans and posters until next year.

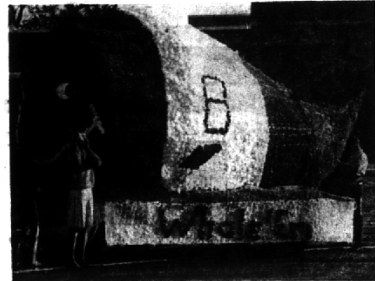

With \$108,397.59 already in the local United Foundation office and still more coming in, the goal of \$82,500.00 for the Torch Drive in the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills division is \$25,897.89 over quota. This is the final report of Henry J. Whiting, local campaign chairman. Whiting reported that the business section is nearing the quota of \$15,000 and it is believed it will go over the top when all the pledges are in.

The Public Service Commission has approved an application of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company eliminating overtime charges on all one-unit, interzone messages in the Detroit district exchange, effective this Saturday. For Birmingham users, starting on that date, the order will remove overtime charges on calls to Longacre, Royal Oak and Southfield. Overtime charges will also be eliminated on calls to Auburn Heights, Big Beaver and Pontiac sometime next spring.

The Bloomfield Hills city commission, at their last meeting Tuesday night, adopted the uniform traffic ticket for that area. The ticket will probably go into effect about the first of the year. In the meantime, police personnel will be trained in the use of the new form of violations summons.

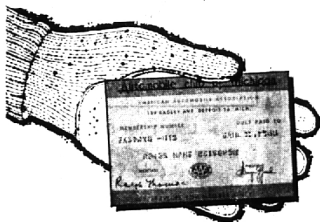

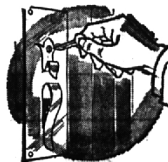

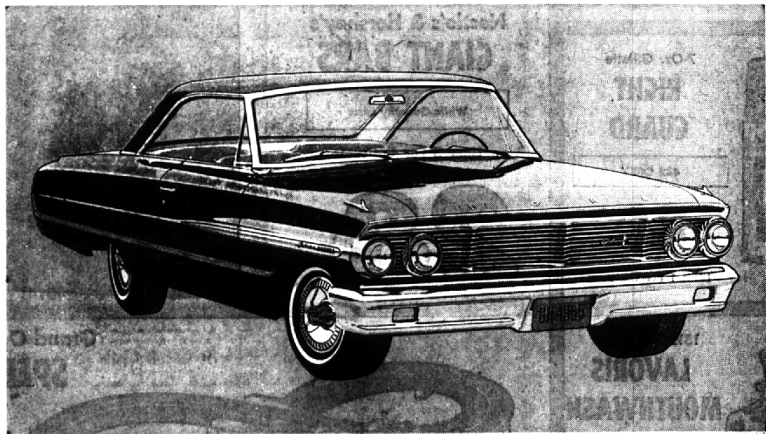
