Before completion, however, he decided to enter the ministry. He studied at the Virginia Seminary and upon graduation served as curate of Christ Church in Grosse Pointe.

ORT Sabbath Celebrated at Area Temples
Throughout the country, ORT Sabbath is traditionally held in November. The purpose is to enable members of Women's American ORT (Organization for Rehabilitation through Training) to join with their co-religionists in giving thanks for the Jewish lives that have been saved and rehabilitated through ORT vocational training.

ORT is the recognized vocational training and education agency for the Jewish people, with 583 vocational training centers, schools and workshops in 22 countries on five continents.
ORT is the largest non-governmental vocational training agency in the world. Through its 84-year history, ORT has been guided by the belief that man is best aided, not by charity, but by helping him to help himself.
