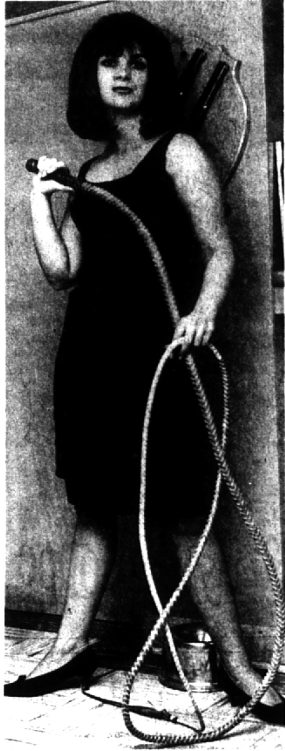


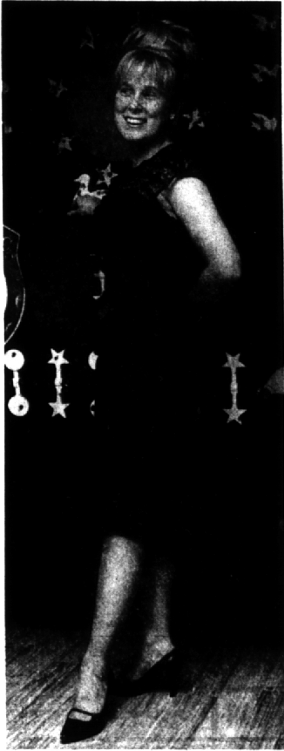
High Style Marks Week In B'ham
