Mrs. K. N. Ryden, Riverside Drive, Birmingham, will be the principal speaker at the Delta Delta Delta Founder's Day luncheon today at the Dearborn Country Club.

The Dearborn alumnae will host the luncheon, and a second Birmingham speaker will be Mrs. John E. Lane, president of the local Tri-Delta alumnae.

Mrs. Ryden will recount some of her experiences as a ham radio hobbyist. She has talked with fellow hams in many foreign countries, including the satellite

countries behind the Iron Curtain, and has entertained as house guests visitors she has met via the air waves from Ecuador, Peru, and New Zealand.

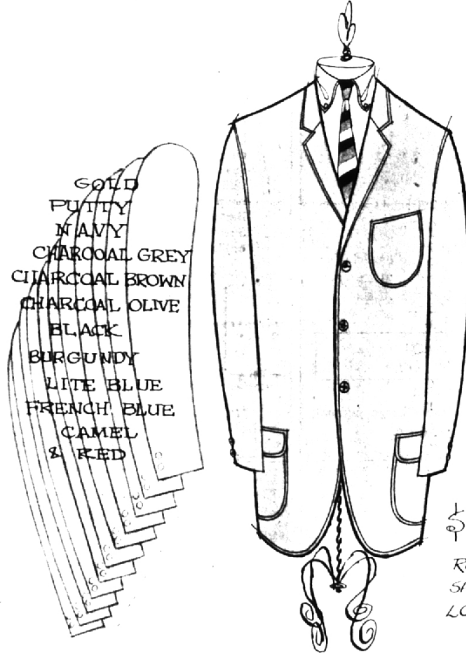
Zeta Tau Alpha alumnae have pioneered philanthropically in work with the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults and Easter Seal Society.

Detroit area alumnae of Zeta Tau Alpha also assist the local Detroit Society for Crippled Children and Adults by contributing volunteer hours for typing and clerical work for the Easter Seal drive, and have provided a set of film strips on cerebral palsy for the Detroit Public Library.
