BARNUM

Parents, teachers and principals swarmed into Barnum School auditorium Thursday night for the PTA sponsored program "Learning to Learn."

More than 400 people heard Dr. Morton Botel, assistant superintendent of Bucks County schools, give the keynote address. They then broke up into small discussion groups which met in assigned classrooms and later returned to the auditorium for part three of the program, the "Reaction Panel."

Dr. Botel said that to expect a student to complete an assignment without knowing how to study is like asking someone who doesn't know how to swim to get to the other side of the lake without a boat.

Telling about how he first learned to study when he read a book entitled "How to Read a Book" by Dr. Adler, Dr. Botel described what he called structured reading. It is a method of studying which involves "neither copying notes nor fast reading" but requires the ability to pick out the main ideas in a given chapter or paragraph and remember them.

Written questions from the audience were answered by a panel of educators: Dr. Botel, Dr. Warren S. Kennison, psychiatric consultant, Birmingham schools; Dr. David Makinson, associate professor of Social Studies education, Wayne State University; Dr. Donald E. P. Smith, associate professor and chief of Reading Services, University of Michigan; Dr. John E. Tirrell, President Oakland County Community College; Dr. David Wells, director of Mathematics Education, Oakland schools; Dr. John Blackhall Smith, superintendent of Birmingham schools, was panel moderator.

The most frequently asked question was "How can parents motivate their child?" Some of the answers were: "The most important thing in motivating a child is interest and love of the parents."

"Design a program in which he can be successful."
"They need the interest of both parent and teacher."
"They need a good home environment with plenty of books, magazines and newspapers available and stimulating conversation at meal time."
"How not to motivate your child."
"By threats or by bribes."
"Special Services."

It is a group of men on loan from the savings and loan industry in the United States who are helping to spread the American philosophy of many people saving regularly in order to provide the funds for others and themselves to enjoy the privileges of home ownership through low cost home mortgage loans.

Enabling legislation has already been enacted in Bolivia, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, El Salvador, Panama, Peru and Venezuela. In five other countries, 70 savings and loan associations have been established.
