## All-Star Team, Coach Named In Next Issue

With the 1964 high school football season now past, The Centric will once again take on the difficult task of selecting an All-Area team.

As in 1963, the selections will be made solely from high schools within The Centric's circulation zone. These include Seaholm, Groves, Bloomfield Hills, Cranbrook, Brother Rice, West Bloomfield, Southfield and Detroit Country Day.

Players will be chosen to a first team, second team and honorable mentions. The selection of a Back of the Year and Lineman of the Year will be made from the various All-Area players.

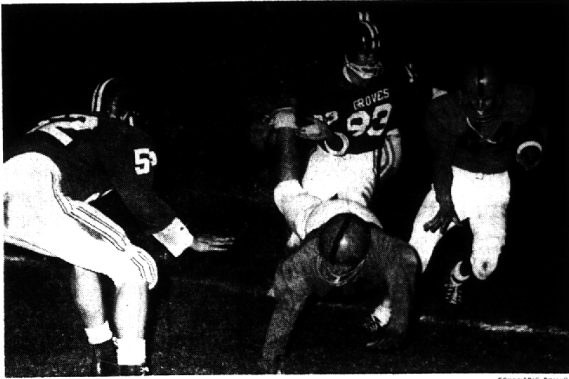
PLAYERS WILL be judged on their performance throughout the season, both offensively and defensively. Individual performances will be weighed equally with contributions to team effort.

The final selections will be reached by a consensus of high school coaches and members of The Centric's staff.

The results will be announced in next week's sports section. Selections will be based, not on a comparison of various leagues and team records, but only on the type of football each player displayed throughout the past season.

Honorable mentions will be selected from every school, regardless of the results of the first two All-Area squads. The paper will also select a Coach of the Year.

THE CENTRIC will also preview, within the next two weeks, the various basketball teams from the area's schools. Groves and Seaholm will kick off the hardcourt season when they meet each other at Groves on Nov. 27.

### 2-6 YEAR FOR CRANBROOK

## Gilmour Blanks Cranes, 35-0

Cranbrook ran into a strong Gilmour Academy eleven Saturday and failed to score in a 35-0 loss that saw the winners score in each of the first three periods and run up 27 yards rushing.

The defeat closed the season for the Cranes, who finished 2-6 overall and 1-3 in Interstate Prep League play under new head coach Del Walden.

Gilmour quarterback Tom Ely proved to be the thorn in Cranbrook's side throughout the game. He tossed a 20-yard touchdown pass to end Chuck McCleathan in the first period that capped a 62-yard drive and then booted the extra point to make it 7-0.

IN THE second stanza, Gilmour moved 97 yards from their own three to score with fullback Tom Selfridge grabbing a 30-yard screen pass from Ely for the marker. Ely converted the PAT.

Late in the first half, trailing 14-0, Cranbrook tried to move through the air. Ely picked off a Crane aerial on the 10 and Gilmour traveled 90 yards for another touchdown. A 37-yard pass from Ely to Selfridge added the six points and Ely added the extra point.

Gilmour put the contest away at the end of the second half when Tom Callaghan picked off the kickoff and raced 90 yards up the middle for the touchdown. Callaghan passed to McCleathan for the two points to close out the scoring as the two clubs battled through a scoreless fourth period.

Cranbrook picked up 73 yards rushing and 136 passing while the winners carried 176 through the air and 227 on the ground.

## Southfield Drops 26-20 Contest to Walled Lake

## Warriors End 15-Game Jinx

"I felt like a champion!"

The words were echoed by Brother Rice head football coach Joe Pasquizzi in reference to the Warriors' performance against Groves Friday night at Seaholm.

Why? Well for one thing, Brother Rice had defeated the Falcons, 31-6, in a most convincing manner but, more important, the victory had ended a 15-game drought that began back in 1962 and continued through two years of play in the Central Catholic First Division.

Rice had gone through seven straight defeats this year and had a total of 15 on the line, but the Warriors more than made up for it Friday.

GROVES SCORED first to lead 6-0 and it looked like another Warrior loss in the making, but not for long. Scarbacks Dan Corrigan and Bob Rininger took care of that.

After the Falcons marched 45 yards to score in the closing minutes of the first quarter, with quarterback Green sneaking across, the rest of the game belonged to Rice as Warrior fans finally had something to yell about.

On the first play from scrimmage after the kickoff, Corrigan raced off left tackle for 67 yards to knot the score at 6-6 with 28 seconds left in the period. The kick failed.

In the early minutes of the second stanza, the Warriors took over on their own 40 and the crowd had hardly settled back in their seats when Carl Gromek, son of the former Tiger hurler, Steve Gromek, charged through a gaping hole under left tackle and shot unimpeded into the end zone 41 yards away.

The conversion failed again and Rice left the field at halftime with a 12-6 lead.

ANY HOPES the Falcons may have had to score were ended when the Warriors faded early in the second half when Rice took over after a fumble on the mid-field stripe and moved to score.

## Seaholm Dumps Madison Heights, 34-13, in Finale

Seaholm, fed up with heart-breaking losses and ties, broke open a tight 14-13 ball game against Madison Heights Friday night and went on to post a 34-13 victory.

The Maples, after experiencing several last-minute defeats, made no mistake about losing this one after Madison's 5-4, Seaholm finished in fourth place in the Southeastern Michigan Association.

The win gave Carl Lemle's club a 4-4-1 record for the year as compared with Madison's 5-4. Seaholm finished in fourth place in the Southeastern Michigan Association.

But, Madison Heights refused to give up in front of a home crowd and playing on a new field, the hosts roared back to leave the field trailing only 14-13 at intermission.

Nine breeds plus all-breed obedience is expected to draw an entry of 1,000 dogs from coast to coast and Canada. The show is open to the public.

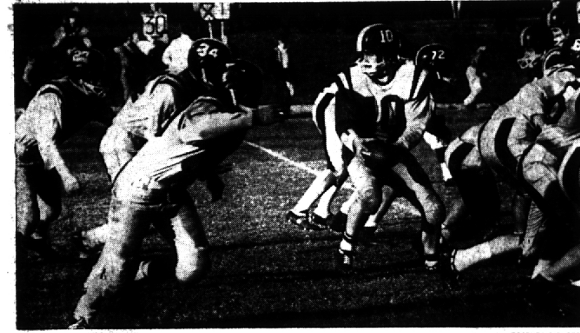

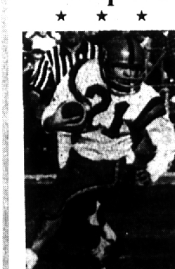
