

State Deer Season Opens on High Note

Michigan's 1964 deer season, despite the 12 tragic deaths that had occurred by Tuesday, opened on a hopeful note Saturday and Sunday.

Half a million hunters moved into the woods in search of the state's whitetail herd and, although rains made tracking difficult and the kill light, colder weather and snow late this week should boost the number of deer shot considerably.

The Conservation Dept. has estimated that the nimrods should take home more than 130,000 deer to top their 1963 kill of 124,000, which stands second best in the state's history.

WITH THE HERD at or slightly above the high 1963 level of 800,000 early season outlooks point to a fall take of 60,000-70,000 antlerless deer and well over 70,000 bucks.

Special seasons are hoped to produce an antlerless take of 15,400 in the Upper Peninsula and more than 49,000 in the northern Lower Peninsula.

Deer hunters are reminded to let the nearest Conservation field or district office know of their whereabouts as soon as they reach their destinations.

Also, all hunters staying on state-owned lands are required to post registration cards at their campsites.

Michigan hunters who get their deer can learn more about the animals they've shot by stopping on the way home at a roadside checking station.

Game biologists will tell hunters the age of their deer and antler development.

Hunters who shoot collarred deer should notify the Conservation Dept., since these animals were tagged to learn more about the northern range of the herd.

Corrigan picked up his second touchdown of the night when he went around right end, shot off two Groves tacklers in the backfield and shot the remaining 45 yards down the sidelines to make it 19-6.

The Warriors still weren't through. Obviously enjoying their sudden success as much as their loyal fans were, Rice hit paydirt the very next time they had the ball.

Quarterback Jim Chenet hit Gromek with a five-yard toss and Paul Lutz picked up a first down at the Groves 45. From there, Ringer shotoff left-tackle and went 45 yards untouched for another Warrior score to widen the gap to 24-6.

Again the Falcons were held in check and Rice moved to the Groves 21 on a 35-yard pass from Chenet to Carl Tracy as the third period ended.

A holding penalty and some fine Groves defensive work pushed the Warriors back to the 20 after moving down to the seven, but Rice was not to be denied a final touchdown.

ON FOURTH down, Chenet spotted Ringer in the corner of the end zone and the Warrior made a leaping grab for the six points. Kevin O'Connor added the conversion and Rice had his 31-6 victory.

Brother Rice had two more drives halted in the late stages of the game as the Groves defense stiffened. But the Falcons failed to mount a serious drive after their only touchdown in the first period.

Groves coach Jim Kinnison used

both Green and Mike Rafferty at quarterback in an effort to get an attack going, but the running of Tom McKennie and Ron Oehler were the only bright spots in the Falcon offensive game. Groves finished 2-7 on the year.

Rice, after showing what they can do outside their loop, displayed a breakaway offense. Pascuzzi cited Corrigan on offense and tackle Dan Parks in the line as putting out great efforts.

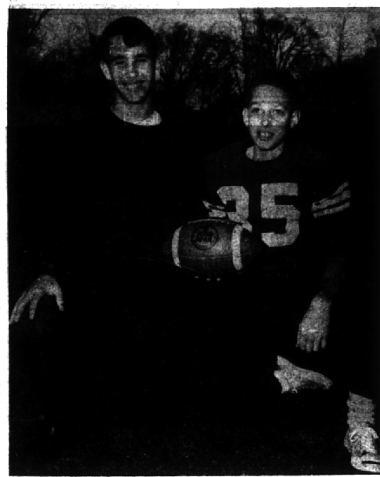
Basic foil as well as Intermediate and Advanced work for upper elementary students through senior high school students will be offered at Bloomfield Hills High, starting Dec. 5.

Colorado Ski Trip Offered by B'ham Y

Fifteen to 18-year-old boys and girls in the Birmingham area are being offered an opportunity to get in some skiing, probably the last of the 1964-65 season, during their Easter vacation from April 16 to 25 in Colorado.

Located 66 miles due west from Denver in the Arapahoe National Forest, the area has 55 miles of open slopes with a top elevation of 12,500 feet and base facilities at 10,500 feet, approximately 1,000 feet higher than Aspen.

Because of the elevation, this is one of the few places that will still have snow in April, which is why the Birmingham YMCA, who is sponsoring the trip, has chosen this site.

THERE ARE 22 ski runs, some three miles long, with an east to northwest exposure suitable for everyone from beginners to the most experienced skiers.

Facilities include two double chair lifts, one of which is 3,900 feet long with a 700 foot rise and a capacity of 850 skiers per hour, while the other is 4,000 feet long with a rise of 1,000 feet and a capacity of 600 per hour.

The single chair lift accommodates 220 per hour and the four poma lifts service 2,900. There are three practice slopes and one is lighted for evening skiing.

The instructor is an Olympic skier who has coached the United States Olympic and college teams. The Y can only take 60 students on this trip and has arranged for one chaperone for every 10 students, among them Chet McLemore of the "Y" and Mr. and Mrs. Jim Wilson of Birmingham.

Students will be housed in separate dormitories and there will be regulations, to be discussed with the parents, which must be agreed to before registrations will be accepted.
