## Stock Picture Good, Analyst Tells Women

So long as the standard of living continues to increase so rapidly common stocks will be good long term investments, Lucien O. Hooper, senior analyst, for W. E. Hutton & Co. told the Village Voters Club of Birmingham on a dinner meeting recently.

Hooper asserted that the standard of living in this country has increased faster since World War II, more than the standard of living ever has risen in any country during a corresponding period in the history of the world.

The rise in common stocks would not have been possible but for the growing demand for goods and services which a rising living standard creates, he said.

"THERE IS very little irresponsible speculation in stocks at present," said Hooper. "Actually fantastically high price-earnings ratios have been in a process of deflation since 1961."

"A U. S. Company of America, for instance, which formerly sold at 61 times earnings is now back to around 22 times earnings. Relatively few stocks now sell as high as 30 times earnings whereas in 1960-1 scores of issues were at more than 50 times earnings."

"The rate of increase in earnings next year probably will not be as rapid as in 1964. There are more uncertainties which may cause some intermediate irregularity in share prices, among them are the possibility of a moderately higher interest rates, some real estate problems, the balance of payment problems of Britain, the policy of new leaders in Russia, and a solution of the great dilemma in S. E. Asia."

"Most people do not realize that the American dollar in the past 10 years has depreciated less than any major world currency. The depreciation of the dollar in the past 10 years has been at the rate of 13% per annum compounded."

"This compares with 18% for the Swiss franc, 2% for the German mark, 2.6% for the British pound, 3.2% for the Japanese yen and 4% for the French franc."

## Traffic School Discussion Held For Oakland

A meeting was recently held for establishing a traffic school to be used by the Southfield Municipal Court and other courts in Oakland County.

The meeting was called at the request of Judge Clarence A. Reid, Jr. who feels that the traffic problem in the area is becoming more severe and that some of the defendants who appear before him should attend a traffic school.

At the present none is available in Oakland County; in fact, there are very few in the state.

## Hospitals to Share In Mental Services

With the promise of state approval of its 1964-65 budget this week, Oakland County Community Mental Health Services Board will formally open the door and invite four general hospitals into the program.

The lever was pulled to begin operation of a mental health services program in Oakland County when Dr. Robert A. Kimmich, state mental health director, told the board to "go ahead and implement the program in Oakland County."

Paul N. Averill, Birmingham, board chairman, told the board Friday that Kimmich indicated that the \$307,105 budget will be approved formally this week. The hospitals expected to participate in the program are Beaumont, St. Joseph's Mercy, Providence and Pontiac General Hospital.
