

# 2 Groves Athletes Receive Parents' Awards at Banquet

Dave and Jim were chosen by members of the teams and their coaches for these awards which are based on leadership, scholarship and sportsmanship. Only seniors are eligible for this honor. Other boys received varsity letters or participation awards.

If accepted they will spend next summer of the 1965-66 school year in a foreign country. They will live with a foreign family and participate in their activities.

In the 52nd renewal of a traditional rivalry, Birmingham's football team will meet Royal Oak on the latter's Memorial field, Woodward and 13 Mile, at 10:30 tomorrow morning. The game will mark the silver anniversary of the trophy, first presented in 1924 and now in Birmingham's possession. The Maples, who have looked up records to see that only three Maroon teams have kept the jug for a period of two years and the last time in 1932 and 1938, will try to become the fourth team to achieve such a goal.

Downtown Birmingham began to take on the Yuletide appearance Sunday as members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce started putting up their annual decorations. It will be about two weeks before the task is completed. The program was begun last year by the Jaycees. Birmingham's merchants are aiding it this year through additional financial assistance. Maple will be decorated from Hunter to Bates, and Woodward south to Lincoln.

Nine Southern Oakland county communities, including Birmingham, are going to see if economies can be obtained from a cooperative attempt to collect garbage and rubbish. Birmingham city commissioners Monday night approved a \$317.08 appropriation as the city's share in the cost of hiring a competent Detroit firm to undertake the investigation. The total cost of the survey will be \$3,000, or 2 1/2 cents per capita for the nine communities.
