MRS. HUGH MURRAY had a coffee last Friday morning to re-

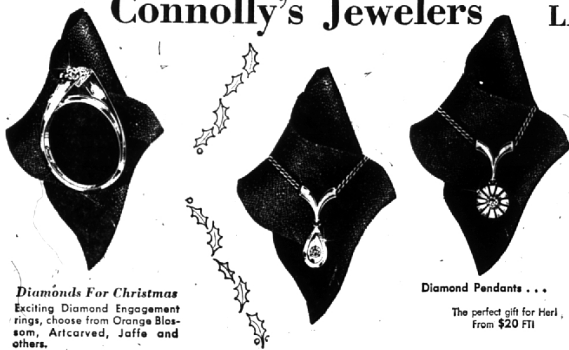

Overwatering is a primary cause of house plant failure, so be sure to water them less frequently during fall and winter.

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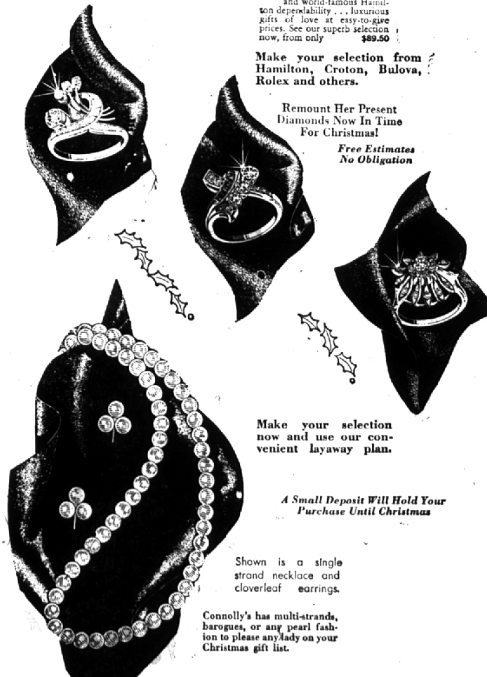


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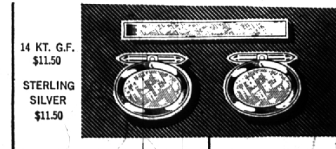
Shown is a single strand necklace and cloverleaf earrings.

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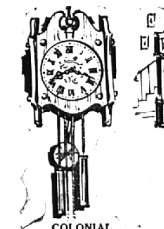


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
