

Some Myths Exploded About Winter Driving

Do you really know how to care for your car in winter? Should you warm it up by driving it or idling it? How about preventing the engine from flooding? Do power brakes work better on icy roads than conventional brakes? A driver seeking the advice on winter car care can find plenty of it incorrect.

To help drivers steer clear of bad winter driving advice, below is listed some winter driving myths comparing them with what auto-motive engineers and fleet operators say:

"AN ENGINE should idle and warm up before the car is driven, especially in cold weather." Not so, say the experts. The best way to warm up an engine to peak operating efficiency is to drive the car easily. Just idling the engine keeps the choke closed longer and raw gasoline washes oil off the cylinder walls.

"Pump the accelerator a few times before using the starter so the engine will start the first time and prevent flooding." Pumping the accelerator more than once on cars with automatic transmissions may flood the engine. The proper method is to depress the pedal slightly, hold it there and start the motor.

To overcome flooding, a motorist should floor the gas pedal and hold it there while he starts the engine. This method should be re-peated every few minutes until the car starts.

"IF YOU CAN find one, the ideal used car is one owned by a little old lady who only drove it once a week." Such a car may be a clunker. Short-run, low temperature driving is hard on engines. Engine combustion is poor with carbon and sludge forming to cut engine life.

"Power brakes make your car safer; you can stop quicker." Not necessarily, say the experts.

Power brakes make you stop with less effort, but not in less distance. They give some drivers a false sense of security, because the power steering, they don't give the driver enough feel of the pavement. On wet or icy pavement this is dangerous.

"Cars don't need as much maintenance as they used to." Despite the improved oils and lubricants developed by the car manufacturers, drivers still are advised to change their oil more often under severe driving conditions. City driving and winter driving may require a driver to change his oil more frequently than his manual provides.

IF THE CAR is not serviced regularly, more than just an oil change and a lubrication is ignored. Brake fluid in the master cylinder, the oil filter, the under-carriage and the muffler may be neglected unless frequent inspections are made.

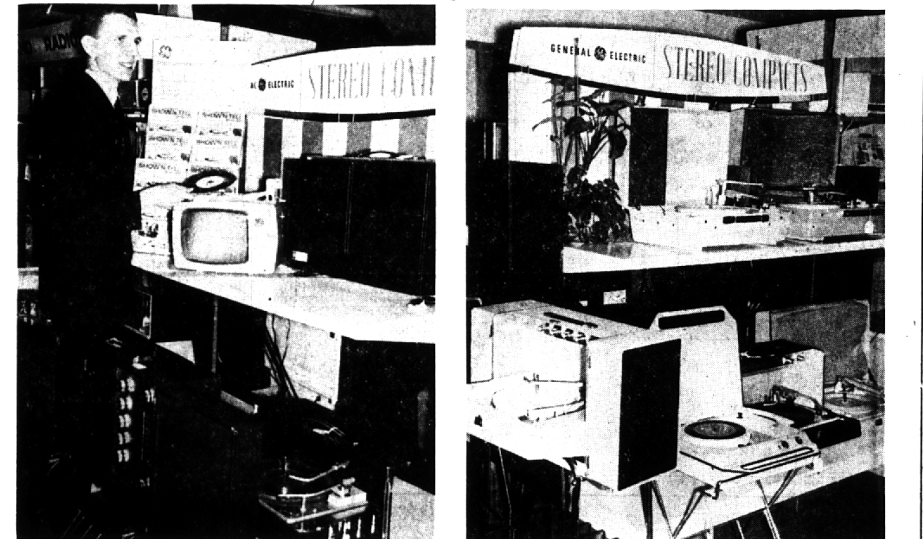

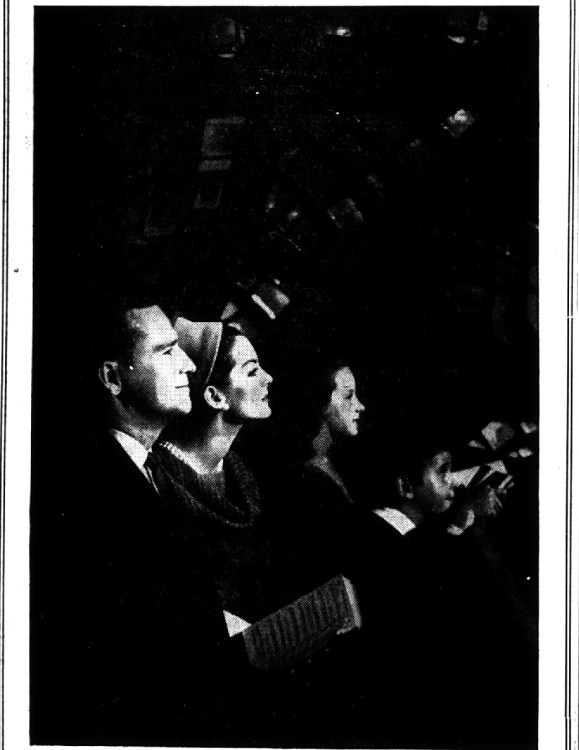
