On that day, the orchestra, directed by Walter Fools, will be rehearsing the "Nutcracker Suite" by Tchaikovsky.

Furthering the spirit of the season still more, the Music Department will present its annual Christmas concert, next Thursday. The Barnum Orchestra, under the direction of Mr. Gerard, and all of the Barnum vocal groups, directed by Mr. Smela and Mr. Ish, will perform.

Mr. Ish and Mr. Smela's groups will include small ensemble groups, glee clubs, chorus, the ninth grade choir and combined numbers with the orchestra.

It is altogether fitting and proper to honor them both in a single effort, not only because of the circumstances of their deaths but also because the soldier had served his commander-in-chief in life.

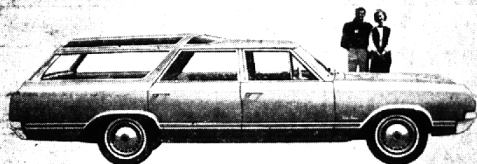
Though I see nothing wrong with spending a few tax dollars for a Kennedy-Groves memorial, I can understand any reluctance on the part of the city fathers to do so.

I firmly believe there should be something in this community to perpetuate the memory of these two men for the contributions they made to their country.



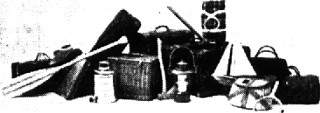

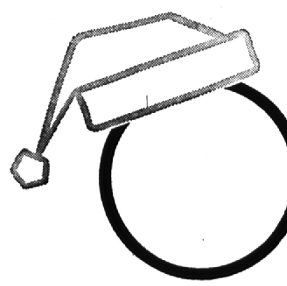
