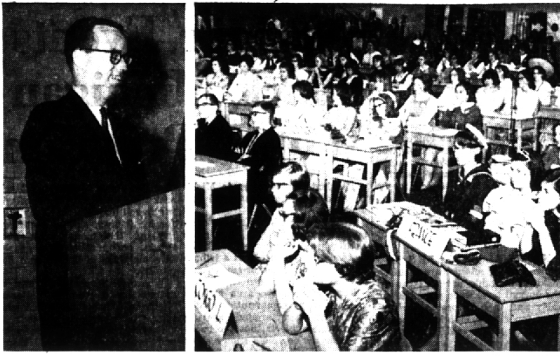
During the week end of Nov. 20-22, four students from Cranbrook attended the annual Lake Erie Religious Conference at Oberlin College in Oberlin, Ohio. Reed Shafer, Pete Beal, Rod Davies and Dave Seel were accompanied by Chaplain Robert L. Darwall.

The conference was made up of boys and girls from various mid-western schools, from cities such as Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Columbus. The speaker, Rev. Ralph Brooks, Minister of St. Andrew's Church, Pittsburgh, Pa., gave three lectures on "The New Morality," "The New Theology" and "The New Culture."

These lectures were centered around the question "Is Your God Too Small?" The participants in the conference attempted to give meaning, purpose, and clarity to their religious ideas. After each of Rev. Brooks' lectures, the students split up into discussion groups, which the Cranbrook representatives felt were quite fruitful.

Some ideas that were brought forth in the lectures and discussions were: "The individual is responsible for making decisions in various situations." "One's faith has to be personally discovered and interpreted;" "How can a person keep ultimate values in our 'New Culture?'"

The schools which sent representatives to the conference were: Shady Side Academy, Kiski, Western Reserve Academy, Cranbrook, Cleveland University School, Sewickley Academy, Old Trail School, Laurel School, Winchester-Thurston School, The Ellis School, Columbus Academy, Detroit Country Day School and DeVaux School.

## Marian Students Stage Third Annual Model United Nations

All the publicity had promised that it would be a "a unique U.N.," and that was exactly what proved to be. The proceedings of the culminating months of work that had begun last May.

The first session, as well as those that followed, were conducted by President Colleen Taylor and Secretary General Doris Flaherty.

The three questions, those of the establishment of a permanent police force, Yemen and the enlargement of the Security Council, were discussed in the committee meeting which were very well handled by Anne Nemitz, Maureen McFowan and Leslie Mahler, respectively.

The proposals that had sufficient support to pass through committee were debated and voted on in the actual General Assembly.

THE HIGHLIGHT of the days' proceedings was a very inspiring speech given by Mr. Malcolm Dooley, brother of the late Dr. Tom Dooley.

The final General Assembly session ended with the presentation of a White Paper, a situation which demands immediate action. The subject, the action which should be taken to resolve the situation in the Belgian Congo, was kept secret until the very minute it was submitted in the form of a proposal by the Secretariat.

The final motion made was to thank all the people who were responsible for making the model U.N. possible: the moderator, Sr. Kenneth Marie and the faculty advisors: the judges, Mrs. H. Brian, Brother Nash and Sister Rose Marian.

Also the freshmen who served as pages and messengers, the boys from Brother Rice who served as Sergeant At-Arms, the demonstrators; the secretaries of the committees, Mary Eliza Laitz Hillier and Anne Marie Stuechel and the mimeographers.

After a 10-minute recess, the judges announced the most outstanding participants of the Model U.N.

THE FIRST section of awards was that of the major and minor delegations. This decision included the evaluation of the displays, fact sheets, costumes, research, the strength of the individual delegates and the unity with which the delegation worked.

The major delegation award was presented to the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic which was represented by Chairman Jean Scholl, Judy Conin and Cynthia Diehl.

The minor delegation was that

of Czechoslovakia, represented by Chairman Fat Smitt, Regina Foster and Carolyn Moomen. Of the two delegations, the names of the Soviet Union delegation were chosen to be engraved on the award plaque.

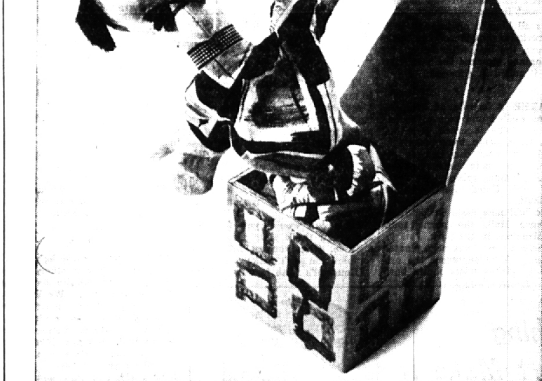
Ten delegate awards were presented. Choices were made on the identification of the native countries in speech, appearance and manner; knowledge of the subject; relations with other delegates and the Secretary; and the delegate's speaking ability.

These 10 delegates were singled out as having done exemplary work: Martha Dunlay, Norway; George Conklin, Japan; Maureen Phillips, Indonesia; Linda Gibson, the USA; Dathy McPhail, also of the USA; Jim Bodary, Ghana; George McLaughlin, Canada; Barb Zawacki, Poland; Jean Scholl, the USSR; Cynthia Diehl, also of the USSR.

Both Alderisio received a medal for outstanding work in the field of research. AND THIS the third annual Marian Model United Nations ended. The delegates were a little more exhausted, a little more familiar with foreign affairs and parliamentary procedure, a little more appreciative of other countries' customs and ideologies and much more grateful for the opportunity of being an American.
