

# Rural Heritage A Point For Move to Suburbs

Suburbia has more than its share of young adults. It has more than its share of persons 25-44 years old and are under-represented in the age brackets over 44, particularly among persons 65 and over. No doubt strong rural heritage is an important element in the fact that many people give the rearing of children as the reason for moving to the suburbs. The persons who make this move include more than their share of the age groups that are most likely to bear children, and also of children under 15.

The 1960 census reported some under-representation of persons in the 15-24 year age bracket, partly because many of the families were young and had not yet had time to have children at these ages.

THIS IS THE age bracket for leaving the parental family and young people in this age group go away to college, to their first jobs, and to establish their own families. Such changes often involve a move to the city.

The suburban areas experienced the full effect of the increased birth rates after the end of World War II and the high rates of migration on the part of young families who either brought their children with them or soon after began having children.

The counterpart of the demand for housing and shopping centers was the rapidly growing demand for schools and all other community facilities.

Rapid growth of the suburbs is not new, but the growth during the 1950's was especially rapid. But suburban areas are not necessarily characterized by successions of young people moving in to replace older families whose children are grown.

THERE ARE some older suburbs which have become communities of older people, though in less extreme form than is the case in many small towns in the farming regions. Home ownership, community ties, and the difficulty of

# DIT Grant Initiates Business School Study

The Detroit Institute of Technology has received a grant of up to \$10,000 to conduct a study of the institute's College of Business Administration, DIT President Dewey F. Barich announced.

The grant was made by Reim Foundation of Ann Arbor.

"The study," Dr. Barich explained, "is aimed at broadening the curriculum and curricula in our College of Business Administration, attempting to match the needs of business and industry for the present and for the future."

"BUSINESS AND industry have been critical of American business administration college programs, calling them too narrow and too vocational in their offerings. We are anxious to get ourselves eval-

uated and put into line with the requirements of the day."

Dr. Barich pointed out that similar programs have already been carried out in DIT's colleges of Arts and Sciences and Engineering.

"We are most grateful to Reim Foundation for this opportunity to make a definitive study of our business administration college," said Dr. Barich. We have every confidence that such a study will help us in our constant effort to improve DIT."

Reim Foundation was founded in 1950 by Harry Boyd Earhart, of Detroit and Ann Arbor, organizer of the White Star Refining Co., which has since been acquired by Soco Mobil Oil Company. Founded to benefit charity, education,

and religion, the foundation's chief concentration in recent years has been in the education field. The foundation is specially interested in the related fields of business administration, economics, and political science.

DIT HAS ARRANGED for Dr. Albert K. Steigerwalt, professor of business history in the School of Business Administration, University of Michigan, to act as consultant in the program.

Dr. Steigerwalt holds a Ph.D. degree in economic history and a master's degree in history, both from the University of Michigan. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Wayne State University in 1946. He began his teaching career

completed in January, Dr. Barich said. "Then it will be expanded, he added." "We will meet with groups of businessmen acting as advisers to discuss various approaches to the problem. 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
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
