

Foster Parents Honored at Tea

The foster parents who board children for the Oakland County Juvenile Court will be honored at a tea on Sunday, which will be held at the Central Methodist Church in Waterford Township, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Oakland County's two Probate Judges, Donald E. Adams and Norman R. Barnard, will speak to the foster parents and they also will have the opportunity to view the plans for the new Children's Village which should be open sometime after the first of the year.

THE FOSTER parents will be returning home laden with packages for their children which have been furnished through the generosity of the many clubs and individuals throughout the county, and wrapped by the Boarding Home Department. James VanLeuven, director of Child Care and Institutions, who is in charge of the foster care department, states, "We are extremely pleased to be able to honor our foster parents during this Christmas season for their efforts in offering the affection and security of their homes to these children who on the most part, through no fault of their own, must be separated from their families."

"If it were not for these boarding homes they would have to remain in care in the institution. Foster parents are an important arm of the Oakland County Juvenile Court, and join hands with the staff in meeting the needs of the children who come into this area annually."

Truck sales from Jan. 1 through Nov. 30 totaled 92,605. That is 32 per cent greater than the 70,090 trucks sold in the same period a year ago.

Combined Dodge car and truck sales for the 11 months total 515,944—21 per cent higher than the total for the same period of 1963.

Future Highways Of 21st Century Now Under Plan

The highways that your children and grandchildren will travel in the 21st century are already being planned, Rex M. Whitton, federal highway administrator, said at a gathering of Michigan State University College of Engineering alumni recently.

Whitton praised the interstate highway system in his speech. When completed in 1972, it will include only one per cent of the total highway mileage, but will carry 20 per cent of all highway traffic and will save the taxpayers \$11 billion a year, he said.

IT IS CURRENTLY giving America the priceless benefit of saving 3,500 lives a year through better safety features and will save 8,000 lives a year upon its completion, he added.

Whitton also emphasized the importance of improving the safety and efficiency of the rest of America's highways. He said this could be achieved by improving unsafe areas of roads, safer construction of automobiles and uniformity of traffic signs and signals throughout the nation.

Whitton indicated that every citizen has an interest. The decisions now being made will affect the American's personal and business affairs, and those of his children and grandchildren.

Textures, Colors Lead In Draperies

Exciting new color combinations and the use of textured effects in prints is the big news for this season's drapery lines, according to a furnishings trade publication.

The textural look is achieved through the interplay of colors, such as light versus dark and the interplay of contrast and design.

Heavy cotton goods with the look of wovens, in the lower-price brackets, will also be important this fall. Textured effects are somewhat offbeat. The main effect is architectural. Molded stone, such as in some of the Renaissance churches of Spain and Italy, is seen frequently. In addition, tiles, wrought iron gates, Oriental rugs and crewel embroidery furnish inspiration.

COLORS RUN all over the lot. Browns are more important; pinks range from the light powder variety to fire engine reds.

The blues, which are strong, are slate, cadet, peacock, turquoise and indigo. Green is still important, especially grass green combined with other greens or blue. Gray as a ground color is gaining.

Colors are important in solid fabrics. Many of the new casements are in bright Scandinavian combinations, often in stripes. Colors are deeper and darker and more varied. There is much more use of cloths of rayon and acetate with a silk noil. Orange silk noil on green is a favorite.

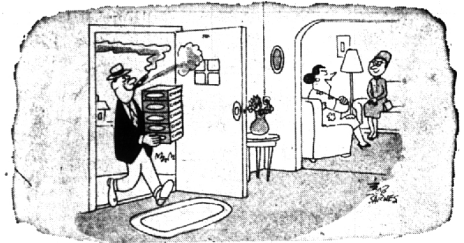
Man-at-Home Gift Selection Can Be Cinchy
