To change from a R-1 single family residential use to B-2 retail business zone use the following described property:

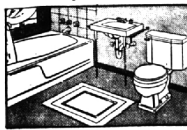

**VILLAGE OF BEVERLY HILLS
RESOLUTION**

At a regular meeting of the Village Council of the Village of Beverly Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, held at the Village office at 18500 West 13 Mile Road in said Village on Monday, December 7, 1964, at 8:00 P.M.

PRESENT: Shephard, Guilmet, Allerton, Wood, Dolan and Shurtleff

ABSENT: McClanahan

The following resolution was offered by Guilmet and supported by Dolan:

1. That the following Charter Amendment be voted upon by the qualified electors of the Village at the regular village election to be held on March 8, 1965, to-wit:

Shall Section 3.5 and Section 5.7 (b) of the Charter of the Village of Beverly Hills be amended to read as follows:

Elective officers and terms of office:

Section 3.5. The elective officers of the Village shall be a Village Council of 7 members. One of said council members shall in turn be elected by the Council as Village President. At each regular village election, 4 council members shall be elected on a single ballot except that should there have been a vacancy or vacancies filled by appointment as provided in Section 5.7 (b) of this Charter, the number of councilmen to be elected at such election shall be increased from 4 to the number of vacancies so filled by appointment. Each elector shall be entitled to vote for not more than the total number of councilmen to be elected. The 3 candidates receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for a term of 2 years and the fourth highest shall be elected for a term of one year. All such terms commencing to be held on the next following the election. The candidate or candidates receiving the next highest number of votes shall be elected to serve out the balance of the term or terms for which any vacancy or vacancies in office of councilman exist.

Filling vacancies:

Section 5.7 (b). Vacancies in elective office shall, within 60 days after such vacancy occurs, be filled by appointment, by majority vote of the members of the Village Council then in office of a person possessing the qualifications for the office of councilman, and the person so appointed shall hold office until the Monday next following the next regular village election at which election the vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the term of the person whose office is so filled as provided in Section 3.5 of this Charter.

If any such vacancy in the position of councilman is not so filled within 60 days, or if 3 or more vacancies exist simultaneously in such position, the Clerk shall within 10 days thereafter call a special election to be held within 60 days thereafter to fill such vacancies for the unexpired terms of the councilmen whose offices have become vacant.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, no vacancy in an elective office shall be filled in any manner if the term of office of the person whose office has become vacant expires within 90 days after the vacancy occurs.

2. That this resolution shall be published in full in The Birmingham Eccentric.

3. That said resolution be laid upon the table for 30 days in accordance with the statute in such case made and provided.
