

Seaholm Wins 5th; Rice Loses

Hazel Park 71-45 Victim Of Maple '5'

Seaholm opened a tough Southeastern Michigan Association basketball schedule Friday the easy way—by winning in a romp.

The Maples coasted to a 71-45 decision over Hazel Park, a squad that had won its first three games. Seaholm is now undefeated in five starts.

The Seaholm victory was paced by three players who turned in outstanding performances—All-Arena guard Harold Wilbur, center Jim Horner and forward Jim Snider.

WILBUR, A sparkplug all year long for Low Parry's team, poured in a game-high 19 points and held Hazel Park's John Canine to four points. Canine, who finished with 11 (10 against Maple reserves), could hit on only two buckets.

Horner, Seaholm's center, had his best game. He pulled down an outstanding 28 rebounds and chipped in 12 points.

Jim Snider, one of Parry's start-forwards, aided the offensive cause, hitting for 16 points, to finish behind Wilbur.

Seaholm rocketed into the lead early in the game. John Toland, Horner and Wilbur combined to give the Maples an 8-0 lead and they were never in trouble. Seaholm led at the end of the opening period, 18-8, and increased it to 57-19 at the half.

Parry used nine players during the contest and all nine of them managed to get on the scoreboard. Hazel Park's Bob Clark led his team with 16 points.

The Maples turned out a much more effective offense and defense than they did a week earlier against Cranbrook in a game that saw Seaholm come from behind in the final three minutes to win.

THE MAPLES, using a pressing man-to-man defense, kept the offense on the run most of the game. The Vikings could never mount a serious offensive threat.

Seaholm will host Southfield tomorrow night in their second SMA contest, one that might prove to be a good deal closer than the first.

Cranbrook Records First Hoop Triumph

Cranbrook posted its first basketball victory of the current campaign, picking up an outstate school, Culver Academy of Indiana, to bring its record to 1-2.

The Cranes, behind center Jim Bailey's 22 rebounds and 19 points, trailed 11-12 after one quarter and ended the first half in a 26-26 deadlock.

But they nosed in front, 38-37, at the end of the third stanza and then broke the game wide open in the final eight minutes, outscoring their opponents, 18-9, to post a 56-16 triumph.

"IT WAS ACTUALLY our defense that saved us," coach Hugh Davidson said. "Tom Van Horn did a fine job on their big man, Paul Kilean, holding him to just two buckets. We had a tight defense and improved our rebounding and on free throws."

The Cranes only hit for 33 per cent from the floor but had a respectable 57 per cent at the line. Van Horn scored 12 points and sophomore John Paschke hit for Buzz Mieras added eight and Sid Barthwell five.

S'field High Grid Coach Quits Post

Monte Charles, head football coach at Southfield High School for the past 11 years, announced his resignation from the post Monday.

Charles, who will remain as athletic director at the school, said he handed in his football resignation because "I feel it's time for a change."

The vacant post will be filled by Ed Bryant, an assistant to Charles for eight seasons and last year's reserve coach. Bryant is a graduate of Olivet College, where he was a three-sport athlete.

UNDER CHARLES, Southfield finished 2-7 last year, their first in the Southeastern Michigan Association. They lost to Seaholm, 35-12.

During the 11 years Charles coached the Jays, he posted a 46-55-5 mark, a respectable record considering the material with which he had to work.

Charles also started coaching in 1954, said the move was not due to disappointment over the team's showing in recent years. "I'm leaning more toward administrative work," he said.

Bryant will be assisted by line coach Jim Richendollar, backfield coach Darrell Harper and assistant coach Jim Kortzak. Another person will be named later to complete the football staff.

IN OTHER CHANGES, cross-country coach Richard Miller stepped down to return to school. He will be replaced by former U-M trackman, Charles Balog, who will also coach track.

Ted Columbus, tennis coach and faculty manager, also resigned. Robert Kennitz, a former U-M tennis player, will coach tennis. Gene Fortner will replace Columbus as faculty manager of athletics.

Warriors Outgunned By Catholic Central

Brother Rice stayed with Catholic Central for three quarters Friday night, but ran into foul trouble and the roof fell in.

Trailing 61-55 with five minutes left in the game, Rice lost all chance to come from behind when center Dick Kreuz and forward Terry Finn fouled out the issue was never in doubt.

Catholic Central, sensing a victory, tore the Rice defense apart and went on to record an 82-63 decision.

Rice not only stayed with the visitors in the early stages of the game, but set the pace. The Warriors jumped off to a 7-2 lead in a slow first quarter on baskets by Buck Murray and Tom McPhail.

IN AN opening quarter that featured numerous fouls, Rice built up a 16-12 lead. But it didn't last long.

Catholic Central, now 2-1 and tied with Rice, scored three fast buckets and went ahead, 20-17. They maintained the advantage throughout the stanza until Rice cut the gap to three, 54-51, as the first half ended.

But Rice never got the lead back. They narrowed it to three several times in the third quarter but fell behind, 58-50, entering the last period.

Fine rebounding by Kreuz enabled Rice to close the gap to 61-55 in the early minutes of the final period and the capacity home crowd came to its feet as Rice started a last-ditch comeback.

The comeback never materialized. Kreuz and Finn fouled out and Catholic Central made the win secure, scoring seven straight times before Rice could hit in the last minute.

CATHOLIC Central's guards, Mike Gary and Bob Long, continually harassed Brother Rice, stealing the ball on several occasions. Gary finished with 22 and Long with 12. Leo Kowalzy led the Warriors with 24.

Brother Rice, now 2-1, was led by guard Buck Murray, who tossed in 15. Kreuz hit for 11 and was sorely missed in the final period. McPhail played a steady game.

GROVES HAD THREE players in double figures. Bill Forrester had 17 points, Dennis Rafferty added 15 and Brother, Mike, chipped in with 10. John Glenn was led by Lonnie Wells, who had 19.

It was the first win in four starts for Groves, a team that had lost to Seaholm, Romulus and Berkley. The Vikings, however, now find themselves on top of their loop in a tie with North Farmington and Oak Park.

Best real test in league competition for Groves will come Friday night against tough-minded Thurston.

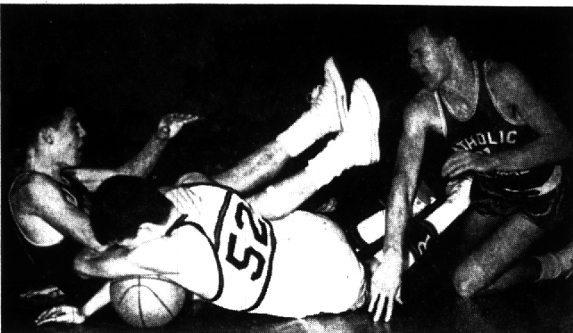

Laker Rally Trips Bloomfield

West Bloomfield scored the biggest upset of the week in local prep basketball circles Friday, coming from behind in the second half to nip favored Bloomfield Hills, 43-42, in the last seconds of play.

The Lakers, now nestled in a first-place tie with Holy in the Wayne-Oakland League basketball race, sport a record of 2-0. Bloomfield Hills has a 1-1 mark.

The Barons grabbed a 14-11 margin in the first period of the game and led up until the final quarter. They upped their gap to six points at the end of the first half, leading 27-21.
