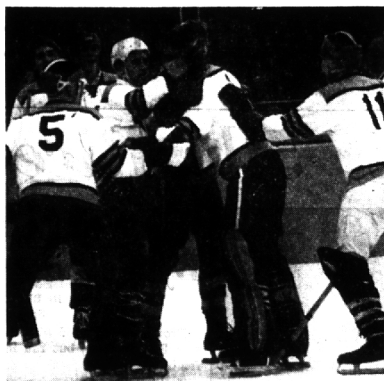
# Lawrence Tech '5 Face Aquinas In Levy Jr. Gym

Michigan Machine Rebuilders turned on first-placed L & L Shell with a vengeance last week in the Northwood Lanes Senior House, firing 1,033 in 2,620 to sweep all four points from Shell's 2,779.

## 1965 Fishing Licenses Out

Michigan's 1965 fishing licenses, trout stamps and state park vehicle permits are now on sale throughout the state at same-as-before prices.

Distribution of licenses, stamps and copies of next year's fishing rules was completed this week to about 4,000 local dealers.

New fishing licenses and stamps will be valid from the time they are purchased through the end of 1965. Anglers may still fish on 1964 licenses and stamps during the rest of this month.

FISHING fees include \$2 for the annual resident license; \$5 for the annual nonresident license; \$1 for the 15-day nonresident license; and \$2 for the trout stamp.

Vehicle owners with 1965 permits will get the green light to enter state parks during December as well as throughout next year. Each permit bought at a state park costs \$2. License dealers are authorized to collect an additional 15-cent fee to cover handling.
