Detroit Country Day registered its second straight basketball victory Saturday over Maumee, O., in an outstate hardcourt contest.

It marked the first time in four years that the Yellow Jackets had defeated Maumee on the losers' home court.

Country Day, trying to reverse a last season's 4-12 mark, is off to a good start. Unbeaten in two games, the Yellow Jackets were led by sophomore sensation Tim Baughman, who canned 24 points, high for the game.

This first season of certified ski instructors along with the only all-certified ski patrol in Michigan to provide instruction and assistance. Ski school classes will be held daily.

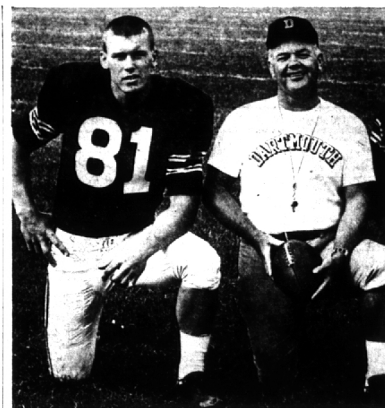
SCHNEIDER first vaulted to the international skiing limelight in 1952 when he captured a gold medal in that year's Olympics.

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GM Sees Continuation Of Business Expansion

Following is a year-end statement by Frederic G. Donner, chairman of General Motors.

The record total of 9.4 million passenger cars and trucks sold in 1964 resulted from and was in part responsible for the steady expansion of the economy and the continued high level of consumer confidence during the year. The high in automotive sales, 4.5 per cent above 1963, the previous record year, was reached in spite of work stoppages and, in some instances, parts and components shortages which disrupted production and sales in the fourth quarter of the year.

Although the present period of business expansion has now continued for close to four years, one of the longest peacetime growth periods on record, most indicators point to further growth in the months ahead. Assuming that this expectation is realized, there is every reason to anticipate that 1965 will be another good year for the automobile industry.

Analysis of both long and short-term factors affecting the sale of motor vehicles supports this conclusion.

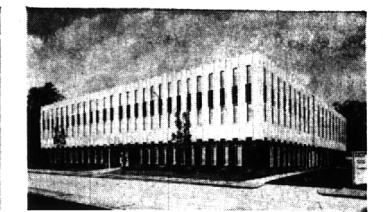
"THE DRIVING AGE" population is increasing rapidly. Family incomes are rising, and this will cause more of the 20 per cent of families who do not now own cars to become car owners. The trend toward suburban living is a further stimulant to car ownership as well as a creator of more multi-car families.

Expenditures for new cars continue in line with the average post-war relationship to income, about 5.5 per cent and well below the experience in 1950 and 1955 when special factors created intense but brief demand stimulants. Repayments for the installment purchase of automobiles are running at about 5 per cent of disposable income, which is in line with the experience of the past decade.

Used car prices continue strong, which makes it possible for dealers to offer advantageous trades to new car customers.

New car prices have remained substantially unchanged since the fall of 1958 even though during this period consumer prices generally have increased by more than 7 per cent. Taking into account some of the greater value built into current model cars, the new car price index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics has dropped more than 5 per cent over the past six years. It is obvious that these improved price relationships have been of substantial benefit to the car buyer.
