Local Women Judge Dolls For Orphans

Every year for nearly 35 years women employees of Campbell-Ewald have been dressing dolls for orphans at Christmas time. This year employees in the agency's main office in Detroit dressed 300 dolls.

Those who make the doll outfits, rather than buy them, are eligible for prizes awarded by Campbell-Ewald. Dolls are judged on appeal, attention to details and quality of workmanship. First, second, third and most original prizes are given, as well as 20 honorable mentions.

EACH YEAR the judges for the contest are chosen from outside the agency. The 1964 judges

were: Lee Murray of Birmingham, women's editor for radio Station WJR; Mary Ball, director of Community Programs for International Visitors for the City of Detroit; and Alice Limperis of Southfield, public service director for station WXYZ, Channel 7.

The top winners this year were Pat Glover, secretary to the Chairman of the Board, 1st prize; Sonya Vartubedian, receptionist, 2nd prize; Mary Lee Selitz, contract department, 3rd prize; and Bonnie Lund, radio-TV receptionist, most original prize.

The dolls were distributed to five orphanages throughout the Detroit area in time for Christmas.
