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B'ham Man Helps Plan New Quakers' School.

The establishment of an interracial Friends' School planned for the Detroit Cultural Center Area was announced recently by the Board of Trustees for the Friends School in Detroit.

Among the members of the board is George E. Griscom, 1700 Yorkshire, Birmingham.

John Bartholomew, chairman of the board and director of the Sophie Wright Settlement, said the eventual goal of the committee is a kindergarten through 12th grade school with a 350-student enrollment.

The committee intends to begin classes on a modest scale this fall in the Unitarian Church, Cass and Forest. Initially, it is anticipated that students would be accepted for Third, Fourth and Fifth grades.

THE PLANS for a Friends' School in Detroit originated early in 1961 when some community leaders approached members of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers). This group felt that the experience of Friends' beliefs and practice in education would make a productive contribution to the constantly demanding educational needs of the city.

Bartholomew said: "Detroit, typical of most large cities, has built social and economic barriers across city and suburban areas. The result has affected all of its public schools."

"There should be educational experiences that take advantage of the cultural richness of the city and provide a child with a basis to judge and a sense of responsibility to the society of which he is a part. A need exists for a school in Detroit's metropolitan area which draws from its diverse population combining scholastic excellence with a deep commitment to ethical values."

A FUND-RAISING campaign of two phases is planned by the group. The first phase will finance the school's formative period for the first three years when it will be housed in temporary quarters. Individuals are being approached to become "founders" of the school by contributing \$1,000 for each of the three years. This money will be used for general administration costs and a principal's salary. Income from tuition is expected to pay for rentals, teachers' salaries, supplies and general operating costs.

A later capital fund-raising drive will be launched to establish a permanent facility and long-range endowments. The building site will be
