Maple-Telegraph Solution Needed Prior to Rezoning

EDITOR'S NOTE: A public hearing to consider the rezoning of one-family residential (R-1) to multiple-family residential (R-M) of property at the corner of Sandalwood and Telegraph roads at 8:30 p.m. next Monday by the Bloomfield Township Planning Commission elicited this letter.

To the Editor: Repeated requests for rezoning of certain parcels in the area south of Maple and Telegraph, "the most dangerous intersection in Michigan," has come before the planning commission.

It would seem that this is another case of putting the "cart before the horse" by increasing the traffic density of this area. It would seem that the traffic or highway situation be resolved before any rezoning takes place. The monster that has been created with the present commercial development and further commercialization will only add to the maiming and loss of lives, under the guise of "progress."

WHAT PRICE must some people pay for a few to realize their dollar gain? It appears that our government in this situation has become considerate of the minority, instead of the majority. I speak as one who has been a seven-year spectator of continuous accidents on Telegraph and who notifies police of these accidents. Only until such time as the "Bloody" Telegraph situation is such that it can absorb additional traffic should the remaining parcels of single residential land be rezoned to multiple.

VILLAGE OF BINGHAM FARMS Proposed Resolution Re Additional Millage

At a regular meeting of the Council of the Village of Bingham Farms, Oakland County, Michigan, held in said Village on the 28th day of Dec., 1964, at 9 P.M. o'clock in the afternoon.

PRESENT: Wright, Lomon, Speicher, Robins, Hyland. ABSENT: Walter Gerick.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Wright and seconded by Councilman Speicher.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the Village of Bingham Farms, Oakland County, Michigan, as follows:

1. There shall be submitted to the electors of the Village of Bingham Farms at an election to be held on the 8th day of March, 1965, the following question:

"Shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which the Village may raise by general tax upon the real and personal property in the Village be increased by \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation for a period of 10 years for the purpose of defraying the cost of furnishing library services to the residents of the Village?"

The Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of the registration of electors prior to said election by publishing the same twice in the "Birmingham Eccentric," a newspaper of general circulation in the Village of Bingham Farms, Oakland County, Michigan, and by posting the same in at least ten public places in said Village.

3. The Village Clerk shall give notice in accordance with law of said Village election by publishing the same twice in the "Birmingham Eccentric". The said notice of the election shall contain the above question in full. The first publication of said notice shall be not less than two weeks nor more than four weeks prior to the date of such election. The said notice shall be posted by the Clerk in ten public places in said Village.
