Councilmen disagreed, and felt it wouldn't be fair to the homeowner. Said Mayor Richard N. Cogger, "There'll be no argument when we say the cost is \$20 a tree—it will be \$20 a tree and residents can decide on that basis."

Five Injured In Crash on Telegraph Rd.

Five persons were injured in Bloomfield Township Saturday night when a car hurtled across the concrete divider on Telegraph Road, was hit by an oncoming car and burst into flames. Listed in good condition at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Pontiac, Wednesday morning were: John A. Perreca, 22, of Dearborn, and Herman Kaman, 26, of Pontiac, both of whom suffered multiple injuries. In fair condition: Mrs. Avis Starr, 55, of Pontiac, who suffered injuries to one eye and both legs.

TREATED AND discharged from the same hospital were Mrs. Starr's husband, Frederick, 57, and a passenger in Perreca's vehicle, Sheila E. Maxfield, 22, of Detroit. According to Sgt. Richard Wheeler of the township traffic division, Perreca was going north on Telegraph when he swerved to avoid a car in the other lane. He hit the concrete median strip, slid across into the southbound lanes and was struck by a vehicle driven by Starr.

PERRECA AND Miss Maxfield were thrown from the car just before it burst into flames from a ruptured gasoline tank, Reuther said. The accident occurred at Orchard Way, near where two persons were killed and several others injured earlier this year. Kaman was a passenger in the Starr vehicle, police said.
