ALSO CONCERNED about increased traffic on the side street is Supervisor Homer Case, who said he would like to see an entrance constructed from Woodward Ave.

Customers who have their cars serviced at the auto dealership now enter and leave through doors that open onto Manor Road. A representative from the company said future planning calls for an entrance from Woodward Ave.

Another spokesman said the lot, if rezoned, would be used for used car sales only and an area would be provided for customers to park their cars.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the board:

- Approved the transfer of an SDD (single land SDD (beer and wine) licensed business at 1081 W. Lough Lake Road from Marshall D. and Rose Kaplan to the Bloomfield Gourmet Shop, Inc., owned by P. L. Grisson and Andrew Schindler.

Oakland Community College Purchases Two More Sites

"When we open our doors next fall, we are going to have 3,000 students."

The number of students to be served and how quickly were the points emphasized by Fred A. Chapman as he told The Eccentric about the purchase of two new sites by the Oakland Community College.

Chapman, 4726 Pickering, Bloomfield Township, a trustee of the new college, feels the purchase of 185 acres on the southwest corner of I-86 and Orchard Lake Road in Farmington Township "will be an ideal location for the college's main campus."

Cost of the parcel was \$471,332. COLLEGE TRUSTEES also approved the purchase of the Oakland County TB Sanitarium on Hospital Drive near Cooley Lake Road at a price of \$927,000. Included in the package are 80 acres of land and three major buildings.

Final approval is expected at the Jan. 12 meeting of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. The sale of the sanitarium to the college has been recommended by the board's ways and means and building and grounds committee.

Chapman said the facilities will be in operation by next fall and will accommodate about 2,000 students.

100,000 square feet," he said. "It will be a complete unit, including classrooms, labs and offices."

HE SAID the trustees have been interested in the site since October. "We will be able to take care of 2,000 students immediately. If we had to start from scratch it would cost about \$6 million."

Conversion of the hospital facilities will cost about \$800,000. Added to the purchase price, the total cost of the campus site will be about \$1,700,000.

"We are gaining not only in money, but more importantly, in time," Chapman added.

The hospital site, coupled with a 24-acre former Nike site near Auburn Heights, will enable the community college to handle about 3,000 students by the fall of 1965.

THE MAIN campus in Farmington Township will be ready for use by the fall of 1965, Chapman said. He estimated that it will cost about \$10 million for construction. The trustees are interviewing architects for the project.

The six-member board of trustees also set up a schedule of fees for resident and nonresident students. A maximum of \$103 per semester for resident students allows for 12 credit hours or more. It includes a \$10 application fee, \$10 per credit hour for the first three hours and \$7 per hour for the remaining hours.

NONRESIDENT students, those who live in Michigan but outside the college district, will pay \$260 in tuition fees per semester. Out-of-state students will be charged \$325 per semester.

The board also established a scholarship fund that will provide two tuition grants for each accredited high school in the college district.

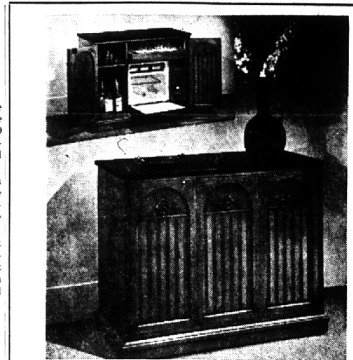
Details have to be worked out with high school officials to determine the criteria to be used, but Chapman indicated that "high academic promise and financial need" would be considered.
