

Lutherans to Conduct Study On Area High School Youths

A study of Lutheran youth of high school age in Metropolitan Detroit will be made during February, 1965, according to an announcement by Dr. Ronald L. Johnstone, of the Concordia Seminary Research Center in St. Louis. The research will be conducted in cooperation with the Detroit Lutheran High School Association, the Lutheran Church in Detroit, the Detroit Lutheran Pastoral Conference and the Michigan District's Board of Education.

The project has been made possible through a fraternal benevolence grant from Aid Association for Lutherans, Appleton, Wis. The Detroit-area study is the second of a two-stage study begun in St. Louis. The data for the St. Louis phase was gathered in early 1964 and the results are being analyzed at the present time.

Seaman Recruit Begins Training

During the training recruits receive tests and interviews which determine their future assignments in the Navy. Upon completion the program they are assigned to service schools for technical training or to ships and stations for the job training in a Navy rating specialty.

Dr. Johnstone said the purpose of the study will be to discover the qualities needed for Lutheran youth to develop into effective members of the church and society, and to assess the factors of home, congregation and the Lutheran elementary and high school in producing knowledgeable and committed Christian young people.

He said that approximately 250 Lutheran students, selected at random from Lutheran and public high schools in the Detroit and Birmingham area, will be interviewed by a staff of experienced and professionally trained interviewers.

The results should reveal a fairly inclusive picture of the attitudes, behavior and concerns of Lutheran youth. "More important," Dr. Johnstone said, "we shall be able to trace sources of differentiation according to family, home, congregational and educational background."

MSU Medical School Delayed Another Year

PLANNED DELAY Michigan year wait at least another year before a new medical facility is started.

John A. Hannah, president of Michigan State University, recently announced that that institution would not begin a two-year medical sciences program next fall as originally planned. The opening date is not definitely set.

The MSU decision will meet with approval of the Michigan Coordinating Council for Higher Education. Council members, including MSU, agree that the state's existing medical schools should be raised to planned size before a third is established.

Although MSU's present plans are for an Institute of Biology and Medicine, within which the College of Human Medicine will offer two years of training, it could easily be developed into a full-fledged college of medicine.

THERE WERE three reasons for the MSU delay. First, the building program dropped substantially behind, mostly due to union-management differences beyond the control of the university.

Secondly, the administration does not at this point have the top-notch instructors they want to teach the program. Teaching staff is a problem for the medical profession, and it was recently stated that there are 800 openings in the nation for medical instructors.

A third problem which was not completely solved involves the relationship between the institute and local hospitals. The medical accrediting committee recommended that this understanding be well articulated before students were enrolled for courses.

It will be difficult for U-M to increase enrollment of its medical school without losing much of the training that is important to doctors, according to Dean William N. Hubbard, Jr. Wayne University.

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OU Seeks Increase in State Funds

A 23 per cent increase in funds for the 1965-66 school year has been requested by Oakland University.

In addition, the institution seeks \$2.3 million for capital outlay, according to O.U. Chancellor D. B. Varner.

Both requests have been approved by the Michigan State University Board of Trustees and submitted to Gov. Romney, who must recommend a higher education package to the legislature.

The 18-week associate course is designed to prepare select officers for duty as commanders and general staff officers of combat or logistical commands in the Army Reserve.
