TO AMEND SECTION 1400 OF THE ZONING ORDINANCE, BY THE FOLLOWING ADDITION TO FOOTNOTE (c):
(c) Every lot on which a multiple dwelling structure is erected shall be provided with a 36 foot wide yard on each side of such lot. Each side yard shall be increased by one (1) foot for each additional (10) feet or part thereof by which the length of the multiple dwelling structure exceeds forty (40) feet in over-all dimension along the adjoining lot line. In order to preserve the general open character of the district, structures shall be limited in height to one hundred twenty-five (125) feet. Rear and side yards shall be provided on the lot as follows:
1 and 2 story structures—45 feet between buildings and 35 feet rear yards.
A 36 foot wide observing balcony wall shall be provided along the exterior lot line of the multiple-family residential district.

Barnum Language Department Uses No-Textbook Approach

"Change is forever with us," said Clifford Kraemer, head of the Foreign Language Department. "Consequently, it is not surprising to find French and Spanish students looking like astronauts as they clamp on their headsets and adjust the controls in the language laboratory."

He believes this change in the appearance of the classroom is accompanied by a change in method of learning, for the primary concern of the modern language student is to train the ear in the discrimination of the new sounds of the language being studied.

Students must show through voice inflection and gestures that they know what is being uttered. Listening tests are given to see if students can discriminate between correct and incorrect utterances. All materials used in writing have already been mastered verbally. One thing has not changed in this verbal, no-textbook approach, and that is the importance of parents.
