on our highways. Last year, 1,859 persons were killed in Michigan traffic accidents.

I have asked the legislature to appropriate \$2 million for an expanded program of traffic safety. This includes the addition of 200 state policemen, of whom 130 would be assigned to traffic duty.

MICHIGAN IS also pushing ahead on an ambitious building program. When I took office last year, I found that further planning was needed. The legislature approved almost one million dollars for immediate effect planning.

In my budget message to the legislature, I recommended \$51 million for capital outlay. This will permit continuation, completion or new starts on 46 different projects with a combined total value from start to finish of \$118 million.

Michigan's reputation and financial strength have been re-established. I will continue to concentrate my efforts on restoring Michigan to a position of leadership among the states.

SOME misunderstanding has arisen about my attitude toward the Republican nomination for the presidency.

My position in regard to the presidential nomination has not changed in the slightest. I do not intend actively to seek it or to encourage it.

But there is no disputing the fact that others have regarded me as a possibility for the nomination, and that this development has turned the spotlight of national attention on Michigan.

One result of this increased attention should be to aid in improving Michigan's national image.

Beyond my desire to see Michigan reap the benefits of this national attention on Michigan lies my conviction that every citizen has a moral obligation to speak out on the issues of the day.

tion. Without the pool additional training facilities would have to be provided.

Richard McGraw said he has always believed a pool was necessary. He expressed faith in the people's support of a well-conceived and planned building program.

The opposition to the high school site was centered on the traffic problems which would exist on Lahser Road between Long Lake and Hickory Grove.

Colombo pointed out to the school board that Lahser is in this section, a 20-foot wide dirt road.

"THERE WOULD be a serious traffic problem both during construction and afterwards," Colombo said. He stressed the intersections of Lahser at Long Lake and Hickory Grove were dangerous.

"I think there are more accidents at Lahser and Long Lake than anywhere else around here. Particularly in snowy weather," he added.

Colombo, an attorney, also told the board there would be serious legal difficulties in obtaining rights to widen Lahser. He said he had prepared a brief which he had submitted to the board's attorney on the legal problems involved.

He cited a recent Michigan Supreme Court ruling which had denied widening rights to the state when the rights had not been exercised within a 15-year period. He said the character of Lahser had remained the same for a much longer period.

ALSO SPEAKING for residents were Jordan H. Stover, III, and A. J. McLaren.

Lathrup Gives Initial OK to New Development

LATHRUP — Qualified permission to install sanitary sewers as a prelude to a two-block housing development was granted to Guy Antonelli Contractors by the city council Monday night.

Council approval of the initial step in the proposed development in Middlesex Ave., from Santa Barbara to Meadowbrook Way, hinges on the receipt and approval of plans from Antonelli for ditching to the Santa Barbara Drain to remove excess storm water.

The contractor plans to start building early in the spring.

THE COUNCIL also learned Monday that the city is having its troubles getting applicants for the four member bi-partisan board of assessors created in December by the state legislature.

City Clerk Stephen Richvalsky said he had received only one application, from Republican G. Griffin Henry. There must be two Democrats and two Republicans, he added.

"There's only one thing to do—turn this matter over to the clerk and have him beat the bushes," commented Mayor Richard N. Cogger.

Mayor pro tem Elizabeth Mitchell suggested Mrs. David Roberts, active in the League of Women Voters, as a Democratic possibility.

RICHVALSKY was instructed to contact county Democratic and Republican headquarters for names

of residents affiliated with both parties.

In other business, the council:

• Transferred \$22,996 from the sanitary sewer fund to the storm water account.

• Denied a request from the Blind Service Center to solicit funds door-to-door, since the Lathrup Lions Club already solicits for the same charity.

• DENOUNCED plans by the U. S. Postal Dept. to abolish the position of postmaster in Lathrup. Resolutions against the move will be sent to both U. S. senators.

• Learned that three candidates have filed for two seats on the city council. They are Vincent Zetell and Mrs. Elizabeth Mitchell, incumbents, and Lloyd J. Barron.

2-Year Duty Plan Issued by Navy

A new policy which permits young men to enlist in the Navy before for two years active duty by going immediately is now in effect.

Recruits between 17 and 26 will head for Great Lakes boot camp within two weeks under the new policy. Previously, recruits stayed in the Detroit area for 16 months and received their reserve training here before going on active duty.

Regular Navy enlistees receive three and four years active duty.

The Birmingham Rotary Club will join others throughout the world next week to observe the 59th anniversary of the founding of Rotary International.

The city of Augusta, Ga., was named by its founder, James Ogden, for Princess Augusta, mother of King George III of England. The city began as a fort in 1736 and is the second oldest city in the state.

Today, there are more than 11,600 Rotary clubs in 125 countries. They claim some 544,000 members.

The Birmingham Rotary Club was organized March 19, 1924.
