In addition to her husband, Mrs. Dinley is survived by two sons, Clarence F., Jr., and John.

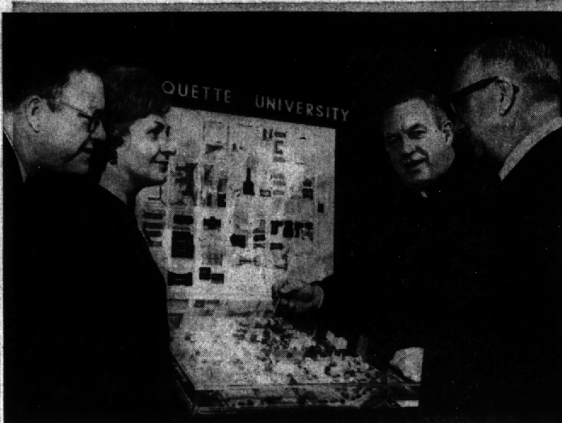
Mrs. Fred C. Nelson

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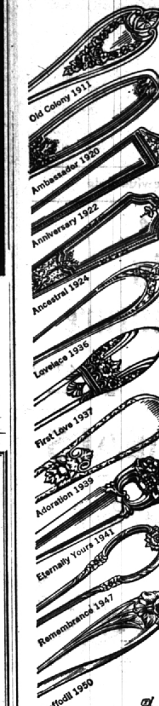

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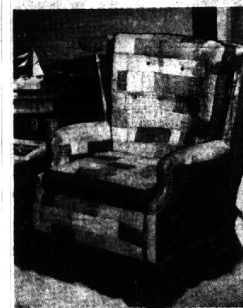
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
