ON MONDAY, Feb. 10, Barnum was honored by a guest speaker, Arjan Arjard, from Indonesia. He spoke about his country to Mr. Bird's social studies classes, answering any questions in excellent English although he had only a slight acquaintance with the language when he came here four months ago.

At present, Arjard is working on a master's degree in business administration at Wayne University. Students were surprised to find that Arjard went directly from high school into law college and, although only 24, he had been a practicing lawyer.

Arjard was chosen by his government to come to the United States for further education. Although his tuition is government financed, he was given his choice of colleges. When he leaves the United States after one and one-half to two years of graduate work, he will serve his government in the field of basic industry.

WITH THE help of the many languages he speaks—English, Dutch, German, Japanese, Italian, two Indonesian dialects and the national Indonesian language, with his two degrees, Arjard feels he can return to his native country, serve his government well and promote good relations between his country and ours.

booths in the gym. The entire afternoon was planned by junior class committees with Anne Fuchs as general chairman.

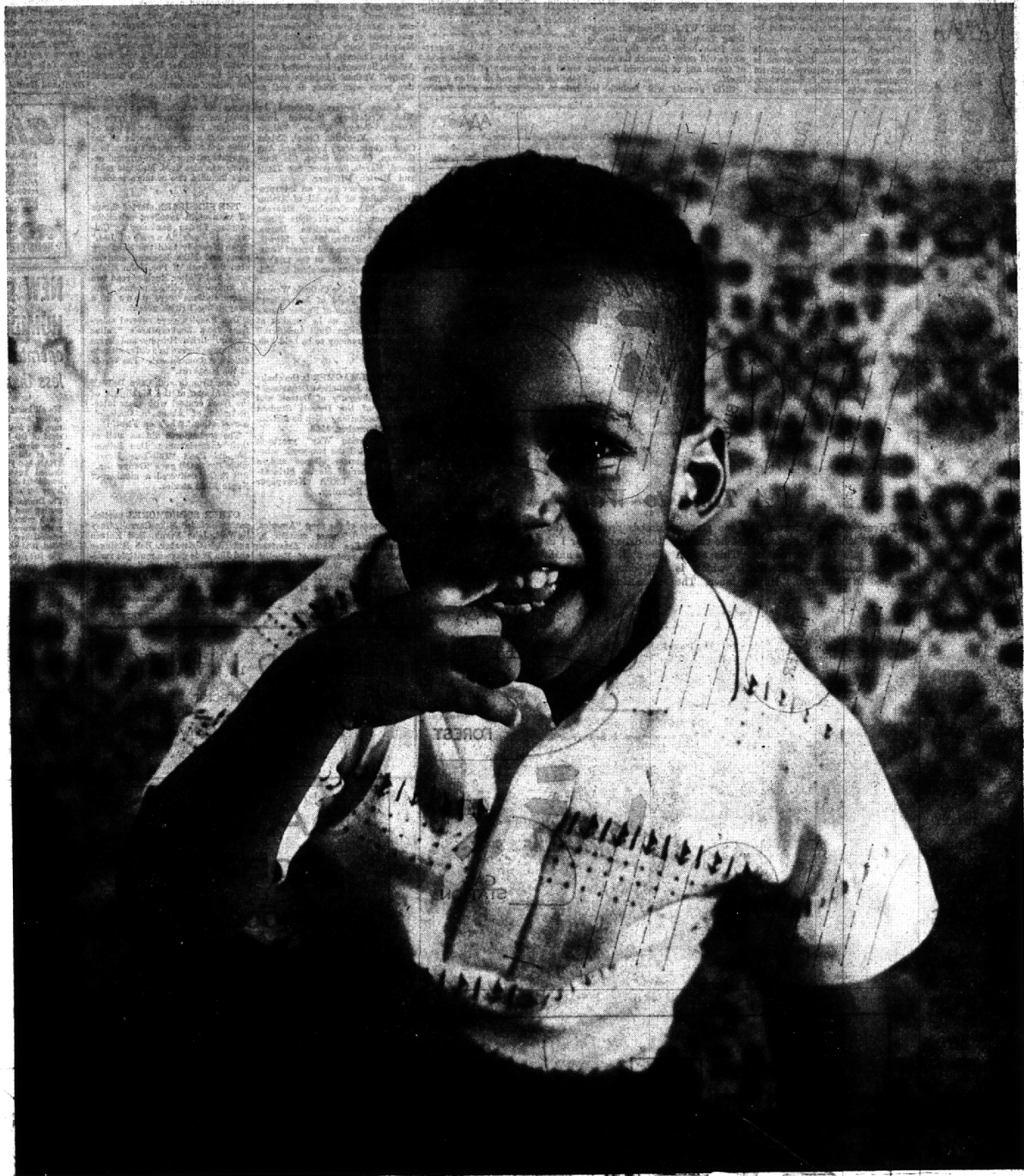
