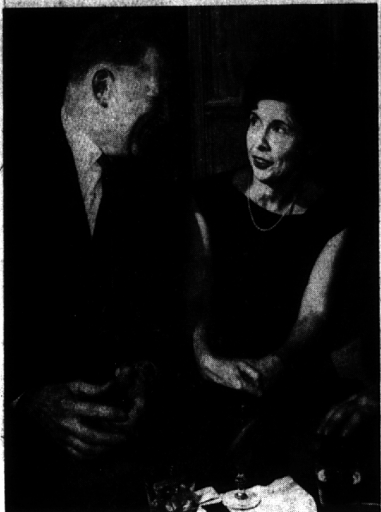


Two-Night Stand Draws Localites to Show
