Ohio Arboretum Provides Ideas on Horticulture, Art

At Mansfield, Ohio, is not too
long a ride from our area, we look
to Kingwood Center for many ideas
which can be adapted to our home
sites.

This fine arboretum was given to
the City of Mansfield by In-
dustrialist Charles Kelley King.
His home was on this fine estate,
and in gratitude to the townspeople
whom he felt had contributed to
his success, he had a consultant
firm advise him on the best pattern
for the use of the site.

Upon evaluating the needs of the
people, he was directed to develop
a cultural and educational center.
Dr. Ray Allen was chosen to carry
out the original premise with a fine
staff.

TODAY THE TREASURES are yours
to share all of the good programs
coming from Kingwood Center.
Naturally, adult classes are stress-
ed, encouraging all classes of
citizens to absorb the fine ex-
periences in horticulture and art
which are planned.

The professional horticulturists
look to Dr. Allen for demon-
strations of techniques for
plant culture throughout the
12 months of the year. The
Michigan Horticultural Society
generally plans a bus trip one
Sunday in the summer to
Mansfield.

Last year the
many thousands of visitors to the
center voted upon the iris which

they liked best. The champion was
Deep Black by name, and the color
was really black violet.

IT IS AN inexpensive specimen
(you can pay up to \$75 for one
root). As the iris today are being
hybridized, you can select specimens
as beautiful as the best orchid.
The time to buy your iris is when
they are in flower.

You can wrap up your purchase
and plant it in a new location
without a whimper on the part of
the plant.

"Out of the West" comes this
idea which is adaptable for our
garden use. For \$10 you can
secure 10 sprinkler heads which
can be attached to a plastic hose
with a 1/4 inch inside diameter.

The hose can be placed on the
surface or it can be hidden in a
shallow trench. It is easy to move
the installation if the coverage is
not adequate.

You can regulate the volume of
water and size of the fan from an
head. This system can be brought
in the garage for the winter
months. The heads are installed
six feet apart.

YOU CAN TELL spring is
coming. The flower pots are be-
ing soaked in a bucket of water
with a cup of bleach for a few
hours. They will be ready to re-
ceive the geraniums in March,
which were given a radical trim in
October and packed like cordwood
in a large pot with a little soil.

They have been watered sparingly.
Those outside lighting fixtures
should be given a new coat of
paint for their debut in early
spring. Redwood furniture can be
painted now.

and Mr. and Mrs. Beth Barsky.

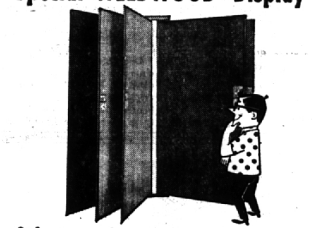

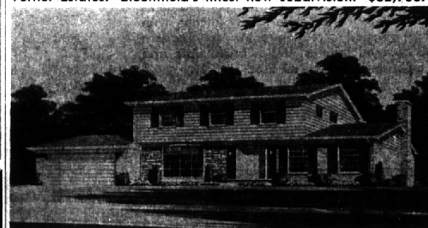

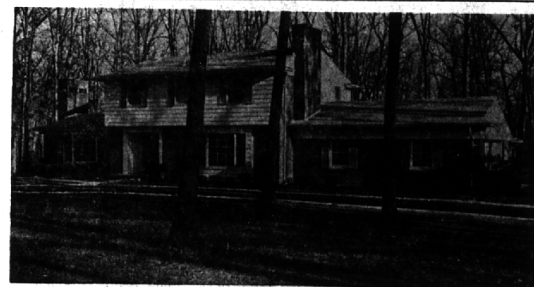
