to the conclusion the suspension should stand.

The youths who received the 20-day suspension are now serving the final week of their penalty.

Pearn also questioned the board as to why no action was taken against TAE, a girls association that had in previous years been active in the schools.

TAE president Mrs. Robert Radtke has told the board the junior branch of the organization is inactive and no longer holds meetings.

A PROGRAM from a TAE-sponsored dance in December was turned over to the board Tuesday night that allegedly contains the names of active and pledged junior members.

Hanson told the parents that the investigation involving secret organizations and school clubs was still being conducted. He said in other business, the board accepted a report from Dr. Smith on possible solutions to overcrowded conditions expected next year at Valley Woods and Beverly elementary schools.
