Miss Harrington's seventh and eighth grade French classes have recently completed projects re-

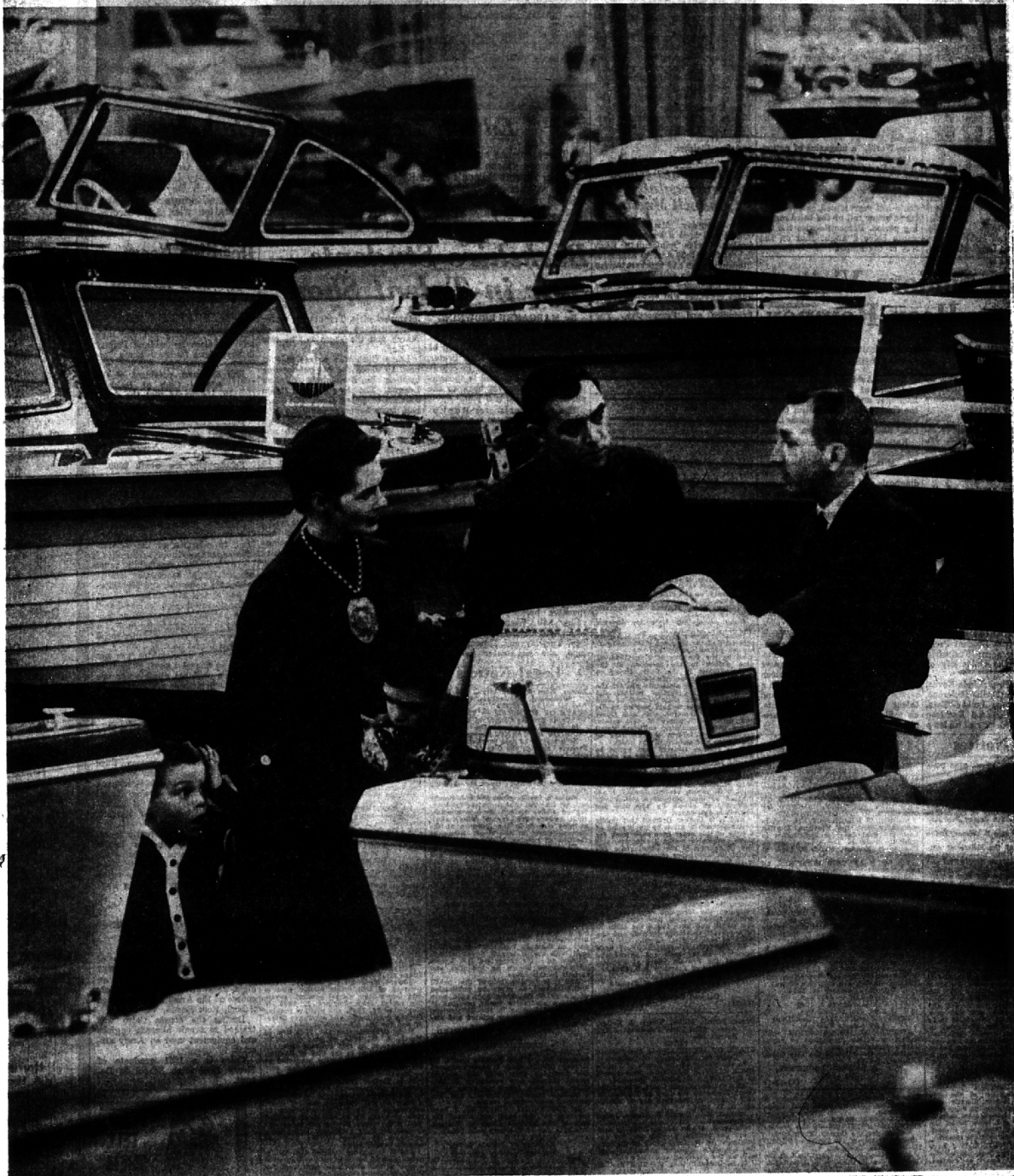
