Plans are underway for the bazaar to be held in the fall by the branch. Chairman of the bazaar will be Mrs. Hugh Clark.

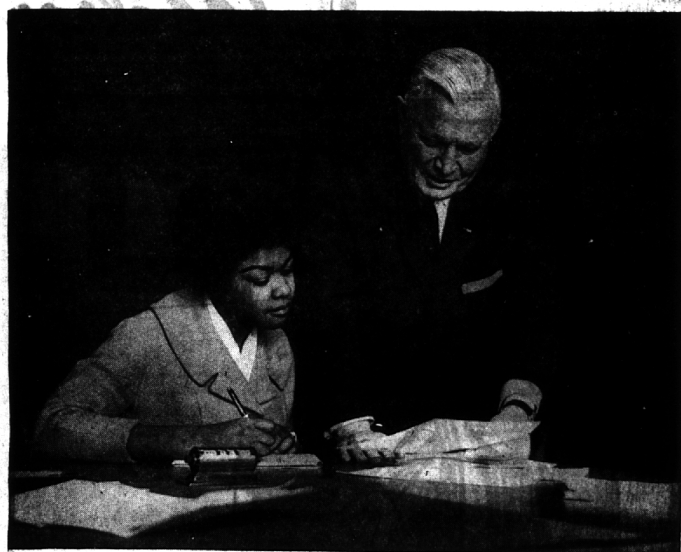

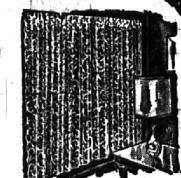
