DOWN TO EARTH

Practicing Your Planting Will Get Ready for Spring

This is the time of year to experiment with seeds and cutting as well as bone up on new ideas in the plant realm.

Just to prove it to you that I practice what I preach, last night I planted pansy seed in a medium size flat. As pansy seed looks like pepper in size, they were spread over the surface of the soil, then one layer of news- paper was spread over the top before watering.

This was done to avoid the shifting of the seed by the force of the water and the paper will remain over the seeded surface until green sprouts show in order to control moisture loss.

The daily watering will take place, keeping the one sheet of newspaper in place. This is the practice for planting all seeds.

IT IS TIME for those geraniums which were shown of their height and surplus roots last fall to be treated like "special people" and placed in new soil, pots, and given a place in the sunshine.

If you travel, be on the lookout for interesting stones which can become a decorative detail on the soil surface of your large choice house plants. They will hold the moisture into the soil.

MANY OF YOU make annual pilgrimages to the South each winter, and if you are driving treat yourself to a stop at Tryon Palace, New Bern, N. C. The palace and gardens were restored in 1950, so that you feel that you are a guest on this historical site as you might have been in the time of George Washington.

Another highlight of the same trip was a leisurely stop in Savannah, Ga. This place was founded as a crown colony by Oglethorpe in 1733 as a buffer against the Spanish in Florida.

You will want to plan on eating at the Pirate's House to capture the charm of the early days.

HAVE ON YOUR walking shoes and wander through the parks, their fountains like the Place de la Concorde in Paris. The home of Juliette Low, with its furnishings and enclosed garden, is a visit which you will never forget, as you will be a guest in the home of the

founder of the Girl Scouts of America.

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



