Cranbrook won its 11th game of the season Saturday, defeating Madison Heights, 65-50. Bob Heinrich scored a career-high of 21 points.

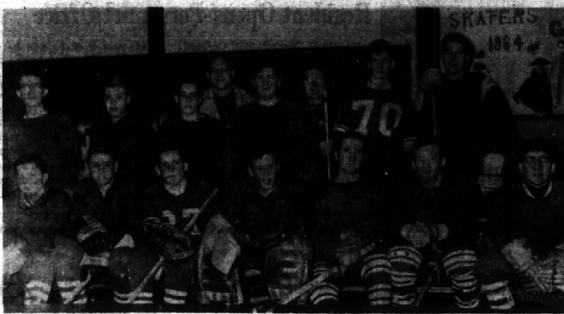
The Cranes broke out of a first-period deadlock to lead at halftime, 34-28. They widened the margin after three periods to 55-41 in the late stages.

This is the biggest dog show of the year in Michigan and one of the biggest in the country. The event has attracted a whopping enrollment of 1,484 dogs from 88 breeds. This is the largest entry in 10 years, and the third-largest in the show's history.

EXHIBITORS from throughout the country are bringing many of the dog-show world's outstanding champions to the competition. Judging will be held in 11 rings, starting at 9 a.m. The judging of the best-in-show will begin about 9 p.m.

Another event of special interest will be the obedience trials, which have also attracted an unprecedented number of entries. In addition, representatives of this area's five major obedience training clubs will give exhibitions of their fascinating arts as a special attraction early Sunday evening.

Participating in the exhibitions will be the Detroit German Shepherd Dog Obedience Club, the Michigan Obedience Training Club, the Wolverine Dog Training Club, the Companion Dog Training Club and the Sportsman's Dog Training Club.

An open letter to the incumbents

GENTLEMEN: Each of you has announced his intention to seek to retain a seat on the Birmingham City Commission in the next election. If successful, you will sit on the Commission from 1964 to 1967, a period during which the character of Birmingham may be unilaterally fixed for many years hence. For at some time in the next three years, the Central Business District Development Plan (CBDPP) will either be adopted, or the CBDPP and the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance will have the point of impact. The City Commission will have the final say in making this irrevocable choice.

It is my suggestion for Birmingham's Centennial Year to mark the 100th anniversary of the city's first time had a choice, to let the residents of Birmingham make the choice of candidates for the Commission. Without a referendum, however, the best choice of candidates for the Commission is the CBDPP. The CBDPP is a plan which sets out the assumptions which underlie their recommendations.

Birmingham, according to CBDPP, will be 1950 and itself with a population of 350,000 persons located in an urban area of 111,000 persons. CBDPP recommends that Birmingham should not attempt to expand its business area and should not attempt to expand its residential area.

Before CBDPP, which you have supported, states Birmingham is retroactively on the road to becoming another metropolitan area. Woodward Avenue between Pontiac and Detroit, Birmingham's widest artery, is a choke and an election campaign for Birmingham is a disaster of which we have spoken.
