WOOD CREEK FARMS—Voters very much at home here—even when they go to the polls.

Voting booths for the general village election on March 9 will be installed at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon P. Fisher, 28396 Wellington.

Appropriately, the voting takes place in the recreation room. This Monday, two trustees, a clerk, treasurer and assessor will be elected.

In the contest for the two-year trustee seats are Watson Kinney, 28705 Village Lane; William B. Smolok, 28990 Wellington; and incumbent Philo Wright, 28446 Westbrook Court.

Unopposed for the clerk, treasurer and assessor jobs are incumbents Mrs. Everett (Alice) Billie, 29122 Utley; Thomas H. Jennings, 29246 Millbrook; and Robert J. Swift, 29490 Westbrook Court, respectively.

WOOD CREEK'S council met Tuesday night and agreed to hold the annual Clean-up-Paint-up week in April. Details will be worked out with the W. C. Farms Civic Association.

Approval was given to increasing the clerk's monthly salary from \$85 to \$100 for telephone expenses to \$50 a month. The change will become effective upon the adoption of the new budget.

Having rejected initial proposals for a gas station at the corner of Middlebelt and 12 Mile, the council convened as a zoning board of appeals to consider a request for variances by Shell Oil Co. representatives.

Architectural details, signs and screening wall requirements were discussed. The appeals board will visit several new Shell Oil stations in the area Saturday to examine materials and station designs proposed.

Legal fees for recent litigation took a big nibble out of village general funds. Attorney Wendell Brown submitted a bill for fees covering 130 1/2 hours spent in the recent zoning case brought before the Supreme Court.

Annual Meeting Set For Family Service

Family Service at its 14th annual meeting tonight will have as its theme "A Journey to Understanding," a summary of its 1963 activities.

Arthur C. Scheifele, chairman of the public relations committee, announced that Dr. Harvey Burdick, associate professor of psychology at Oakland University will be introduced by the Rev. Gerald B. O'Grady, rector of Christ Church Cranbrook.

Dr. Burdick will speak on "Psychological Implications of Race Relations." Mr. O'Grady and his parish have been actively involved in the study of human relations. The public may attend the meeting, which will be held at Seaholm High School at 8 p.m.

ARTHUR C. McINTYRE, president, will give a review of the service to the community. In carrying out the agency's motto, "Strength to Families Under Stress," McIntyre states that 2,688 different families were

served in 1963. This is an 8 per cent increase over 1962.

The majority of these families brought marital, child behavior and personality adjustment problems in that order.

The agency was given in 1963 an additional worker in the Detroit United Fund area by United Community Services. This worker has had an out post in Royal Oak Township and Wall Lake.

IN ADDITION to this fact is the stress that the professional staff is placing on new methods of shortening treatment to families, it was explained.

According to Robert J. Jones, executive director, there has been a marked increase in this activity as well as the further development of group counseling which shows a strong indication of serving more families in the same time span.

Within these families, 1,138 different children were given case-work consideration and 169 were seen for direct treatment, the majority of whom were adolescents.

The latter is an increasing proportion of the caseload, following the same percentage increase in the adolescent population which along with the aged is increasing faster than any other segment of the population.

additional building can be constructed," Smith said.

The school board owns a piece of property at the corner of Evergreen and 13 Mile Road that could be used for an elementary school site.

If district voters approve the additional building, it is hoped that it could be ready for occupancy by September, 1965. This building would relieve conditions at both Beverly and Valley Woods.

BASICALLY, Smith's temporary plan calls for bussing some students where conditions are less crowded or in setting up new boundaries.

The only schools scheduled to receive new students through redistricting at the present time are Pierce and Greenfield. All the students affected would be within walking distance of the two buildings.

Students from the overcrowded schools are tentatively slated to be bused to Greenfield, Baldwin and Midvale schools.

All of these students are already being bused either to Beverly or Valley Woods.
