JAMES I. Murphy has turned the organization of the Brother Rice Model Senate over to a student administration. The Senate administration is headed by John MacAlone, who for the BRHS Senate, is the Vice-President of the United States. Dale Corrigan is president pro-temore of the Senate. Dale and John will preside over the plenary sessions of the Senate.

Jim Dean heads the Rules Committee, which will decide how the Senate will run. Kevin Wolcott is chairman of the committee which will draw up the bills to be voted upon.

The Senate will consider two issues: civil rights and the tax cut. The Senate in Washington recently passed this same tax bill, but this does not mean that the BRHS assembly will do the same. Tom Schaefer, President of the United States, will deliver a message on civil rights to the Senate before the assembly considers the measure.

Sixty-seven Democrats will face thirty-three Republicans in the Senate meetings. The Senate floor, the Democrats also command majorities in the committees which will vote on amendments to the two bills.

PARTY CAUCUSES have already been held and party leaders have been elected. The Democrats' first to organize is Bob Bickner majority leader and Mike Hodge majority whip. Bob holds the Senate seat of Senator Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts. Mike represents the state of West Virginia.

The leaders of the GOP minority are Jack O'Hara and Pat Kelly. Jack, who represents Illinois, now holds the same job as his Senate counterpart, Everett Dirksen, minority leader. Pat Kelly, minority whip, represents Texas.

Terry Carroll and George McLaughlin are the senators from Michigan in the BRHS Senate. The Michigan Senator Philip Hart's son, George, that of Senator Pat McNamara.

MARIAN students hold 37 seats in the Senate. The eight most meritorious positions in the administration. They also compose four lobbyists.
