## WHAT'S HAPPENING IN... NORTHWEST DETROIT AREA AND SUBURBS

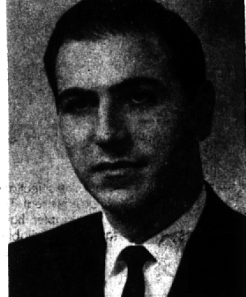
### Birmingham Temple

A new Reform Temple has been organized to serve the families of the Northwest Detroit area and Suburbs. Sherwin T. Wine is serving as religious advisor for the Birmingham Temple. He is now affiliated with the Reform Temple in Windsor. It is his desire as Rabbi "to know all of the congregants, to share and to know the excitement and satisfaction of building and creating."

On November 17, 1963 the first Congregational Meeting of the Temple was held. A constitution was voted upon and ratified. Officers were elected. They are Harry A. Velick, President; Gilbert L. Franklin, 1st Vice President; Steven M. Fish, 2nd Vice President; Suzanne Velick, Secretary; Joel Heper, Treasurer. Harry Velick has summed up the aims and goals of the Temple "to create in the suburban areas of Detroit the atmosphere and presence of Reformed Judaism... to provide families with one more choice in the concept of Reformed Judaism... a small congregation that is expected to remain small because of the diversity of religion in the area; that welcomes the smallness, the closeness, the simplicity of a small community congregation... to create a Temple of vitality, young spirit and wholehearted participation, in which all who belong gain a sense of deeply personal association and fulfillment."

With an anticipated membership of 150 families by Fall 1964, Birmingham Temple will have a fully scheduled program of Friday night and Saturday morning services; a complete Sunday School program and Hebrew classes. All will be under the supervision of Rabbi Wine. Until then services are being held on Sunday evenings at the Eagle School, Fourteen Mile Road and Middlebelt. Services conducted by Rabbi Wine begin at 8:00 p.m.

Adult Study Groups are held monthly to discuss questions pertaining to our everyday living. Some topics that have been discussed were "What is Your Concept of God?" "What are our Goals for Jewish Education?" "Religion and Social Action." The last topic preceded Brotherhood Week and the Birmingham Freedom Festival. Services and Study Groups are open to all members of the community who wish to attend. Any one desiring further information may call Suzanne Velick, LI 2-4591, Marcie Sandy, MA 9-7945.
