Art Exhibition Is Scheduled At Kingswood

A one-man exhibition of paintings and drawings by Dorothy Varian will open Sunday, March 15 to continue through March 22 in Kingswood School Cranbrook art gallery.

Mrs. Varian's work has been widely exhibited both here and abroad, with her first one-man exhibition at the Durand-Bush Gallery, Paris, in 1922.

Her works are in the Whitney Museum of American Art, Dunham Phillips Memorial Gallery, Washington, D.C., the Newark Museum, Dartmouth College Museum, Ogunquit Memorial Museum, Maine, Abbott Laboratories and the collections of the late Mrs. John D. Rockefeller Jr., and of George Nelson Rockefeller.

SHE PARTICIPATED in the 1962 Osasabaw Project when artists from all parts of the world met and exchanged ideas and work on the island located off the coast of Georgia.

Among the pieces in the show is a series of seven paintings entitled "Depth to Space."

Mrs. William M. Milligan, 454 Fairfax, Birmingham, was elected president of the Detroit League for the Handicapped, a Torch Drive agency at the annual meeting of the League's board of trustees.

She succeeded Mrs. E. Govan Hill of 1361 N. Woodward, Birmingham, who remains on the board.

The League, located in downtown Detroit, has branch offices in Wyandotte and in Northville. It trains handicapped persons for jobs, places them in private employment when possible and employs others in its sheltered workshops.

Russell Albrecht, executive director, reported to the board that the League had helped 1,528 handicapped persons during the past year, placing 216 in private employment and 147 in its own workshop.
