**Ask the Doctor**

**BOY FEARS DEATH**

Q—My four-year-old son has recently developed a strong fear of death because of some unpleasant talk he's heard from one of the neighborhood children. How can I reassure him?

A—It is unfortunate that the neighborhood child has built up this association with death in your child's mind instead of a more pleasant association, such as sleep and rest. Try to stress pleasant associations.

It is always wise to assure a child that someone near and dear to him, such as a favorite aunt or grandmother, will take care of him if anything should happen to his parents. Back of a child's spoken fear of death is usually the unspoken fear of what will happen to him should his parents die.

**TRAINING LAGS**

Q—My four-year-old son is bowel-trained but not bladder-trained. He was also slower about walking and talking than others of his age, and drools on the front of his clothes. I try to show patience and take into consideration his slower development, but would appreciate your advice.

A—From your description, your child does seem to be slower than average in his mental development and development of motor skills. I think you would be helped considerably by medical and psychological evaluation of his capabilities so that you will know him better and know better what to expect from him and how best to help him progress at his maximum rate.

In general, I think your approach is correct. It would be wrong to try to push him too hard.

One cannot force a child to learn; he can only be encouraged to do so by the presentation of many learning opportunities under pleasant conditions.

**Post Office Exams Slated**

The Birmingham Post Office is now conducting Civil Service examinations for residents of the city's mailing district for positions in the postal service. Applications may be obtained at the Postmaster's office.

Postal service positions offer liberal vacations, sick leave benefits, health and life insurance benefits and a retirement system. In addition, some branches supply clothing allowances.

Applicants must be at least 17 years old.

**Incumbent Seeks Treasurer's Post**

Charles A. Sparks, treasurer of Oakland County, has announced that he will be a candidate for reelection.

"In finance today, it is important that the best qualified person hold the office of treasurer of our county. Necessary for such qualifications are mature judgment, years of training and experience and the ability to supervise a well-balanced, well-trained and efficient organization."

"In view of the excellent record we have made, I feel that I can sincerely and honestly call on the voters for their support again in our endeavor to continue an efficient and progressive tax collection office."

Sparks cited the growth of the department since he took office in January, 1963. While the employees are about three times as many, the receipts are 35 times greater.

**March 23 Set For Districting Dispute Hearing**

March 23 is the date set for a Federal District Court hearing on the constitutionality of Michigan's congressional districting law.

The decision, to be made in Port Huron, could create a situation in which all the state's 19 congressmen are elected "at large" by all voters in the state. Or, the judges might decide to permit election from the districts as drawn but direct a reapportionment of seats as soon as practical.

The judges' preliminary findings resulted in a 2-2-1 split, calling for a "prima facie" case indicating that the argument charging unconstitutionality is legally strong enough to establish a case unless it is disproved.

**TWO HENRY Ford Community College (Dearborn) instructors, Donald A. Calkins and Karl J. Jacobs, have charged that variance of populations in the 19 congressional districts amount to discrimination in violation of the constitution.**

"Optimistic" was the keynote reaction of two Republican candidates for congress for the 13th district, newly-formed since the original case was brought, against the 1962 districting.

State Senator Farrell E. Roberts (R-Oakland), Oakland University official James P. Dickerson and Pontiac attorney Richard D. Kuhn felt that the primary ruling would not bring chaos to this year's elections in the county and state.

They agreed that the federal judges probably would not block the use of present districts for the November, 1964 elections.

**Boy Scout Speaker**

Edwin O. George, vice president of the Detroit Edison Co. and president of the Detroit Council of the Boy Scouts of America, will be guest speaker at the March 16 dinner meeting of the Kirk in the Hills Men's Club, starting at 6:30 p.m. He will tell members of the club that companies are demanding more of all executives—including character, leadership and dedication—the same qualities that scouting helps build into its boys through its program of character building, citizenship training and physical fitness. He will answer the question, "Does Scouting Really Work?" by pointing out that 27 of the 50 astronauts have been Scouts or Scout Leaders.

**National Drive Led By P'h'am Alumni**

Henry M. Hogan, 444 Arlington, Birmingham, is serving as national chairman of the College of Holy Cross (Worcester, Mass.) development program, a long-range program for increased endowment and improved physical facilities.

Hogan, retired vice-president and general counsel for General Motors Corp., is a graduate of Holy Cross and recipient of an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree in 1948.

In the afternoon she will appear at a tea sponsored by the Royal Oak Republican Women's Club at the First Presbyterian Church, Sixth and Hendrie Streets.
