Royal Oak Man Appointed New Beverly Clerk

BEVERLY HILLS—In a special council meeting called March 11 for the purpose of naming a new village clerk, Charles E. Ferguson was appointed to the post.

Ferguson, 42, of Beverly Hills, replaces Mr. Betty J. Chinn, whose elective term expired Tuesday. In a charter amendment last fall, the voters put through the change which makes the clerk appointive by the council instead of being elected by the voters.

Ferguson, who lives at 1602 Hoffman, Royal Oak, was exempted at the meeting from the charter provision which says the clerk must be a resident of the village. He has been office manager in the village for the past two years.

Ferguson will continue to receive his previous salary of \$7,000. The elected clerk's job, considered a part-time one, calls for a salary of \$1,200.

Mrs. Frederick Dawson will continue as village clerk and according to Village Manager Robert E. Murphy, another deputy may be appointed.

physician to see whether you need a booster." He cautioned against "a false sense of security" from the results of the Salk vaccine, which he said "has done a tremendous job."

Doctors estimate that the two doses of vaccine will give immunity to the three strains of polio from five to 10 years.

ALTHOUGH NO actual charge will be made for the vaccine, donations of 50 cents will be asked. However, no one will be turned down for the lack of funds.

School children will be required to have written permission to receive the vaccine, it was explained. However, officials are stressing the importance of parents taking their children to the centers, rather than sending them alone.

Determination of the immunization centers will be made in about a week.

"During this difficult period the work has not suffered any," Burgum said.

A motion by Commissioner David F. Breck to have the contract enforced failed for lack of support but Burgum said the resolution was not really necessary because if the commission took no action the contract would be enforced automatically.

KAVANAGH SAID his client "knew he had no right to ask to be relieved," but he urged the commission to take some action.

Burgum suggested that the administration look into the possibility of terminating the contract and told Kavanagh he would be notified when the matter would be brought back to the commission for disposition.

Beverly Re-Elects 4 Council Members

BEVERLY HILLS—"No New Faces for '64" was the council's theme song Monday as they fol- lowed the re-election of the four incumbents by retaining Marvin B. Cline president of the council and Hugh G. Allerton, Jr., president pro tem.

Re-elected officials were sworn in by new village clerk Charles E. Ferguson and from then on it was business as usual.

Bernard Feldhauser of McAlpine Engineers, Inc., made a plea on behalf of three of his clients, Walter Bemb, Mrs. Ralph S. Shroder and Irving Taran, for action on their petition to divide their prop- erties in the vicinity of Beverly and Evergreen roads.

TWO OF the properties can be divided without replatting, but the planning board would like to see deed restrictions placed on the properties.

According to Feldhauser, he had been requested by the planning commission to send soil borings to Johnson and Anderson, village en- gineers, but the firm said it could do nothing without authorization from either the council or the plan- ning commission.

The council directed Johnson and Anderson to study the proposed divi- sion and report to the council by the next meeting.

A request by William J. Shafer for sewer and water rights on his property in Cranbrook Woods was approved subject to his bearing all costs on engineering, installation and tap-in, and to the approval and supervision of the village en- gineers, and that a recorded agree- ment be filed with the village at- torney agreeing to participate in any assessment in the future in connection with a permanent wa- ter system.

• An amendment to Ordinance 9 was passed, forbidding telephone harassment.

• William J. Pulte's proposed plat for Georgetown, Green No. 2 was sent to the planning com- mission for study and recommendation.

• A request by Frederick G. Bietman to transfer the liquor li- cense on his property at 31640 Southfield to Robert G. Keydel was put aside until Keydel should come before the council personally to ap- ply. This has been set up as stand- ard procedure.

Village Manager Robert E. Mur- phy was directed by the council to inform Mrs. Ted Ziskowski, 23301

Maple Ridge, Southfield, what pro- cedure she must follow to imple- ment her request for annexation to Beverly Hills.

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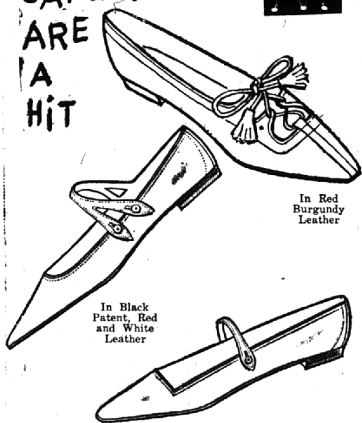
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
