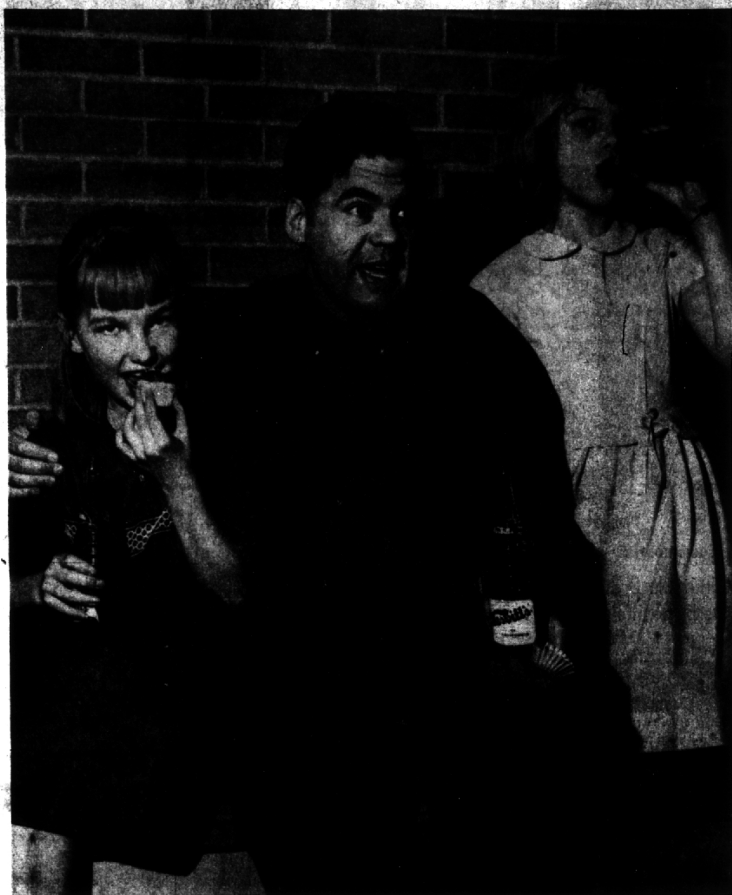


Girl Scouts Set Dizzy Pace At Party For Dads
