CHARTER AMENDMENT PROPOSITION  
CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, MICHIGAN**

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE  
CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, COUNTY OF OAKLAND  
AND STATE OF MICHIGAN

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that at the regular city election to be held in the City of Birmingham, County of Oakland and State of Michigan on the 6th day of April, A. D. 1964, from 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon until 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern Standard Time, there will be submitted the question of the amendment of Sections 9 and 14 of Chapter III of the Charter of said City so that said sections will read as follows:

Section 9. The commission shall whenever a vacancy occurs, appoint a clerk, a treasurer, an assessor, a health officer and a constable, and it shall appoint the board of review as hereinafter provided. The manager may, with the advice and consent of the commission, appoint a city attorney, an engineer, a chief of police, a chief of fire department, and any other officers for whose appointment provisions shall be made in this charter, and provide for their powers and duties. Unless otherwise provided in this charter or by statute, all appointees of the commission shall hold office during the pleasure of the commission, and all other appointive officers shall hold office during the pleasure of the manager. One person may be appointed to two or more offices except that the offices of clerk and treasurer shall not be filled by the same person.

Section 14. Three qualified freeholders and electors of the City of Birmingham, other than members of the city commission shall constitute the board of review of the city in relation to assessments made for general taxation purposes, whether under the provisions of this charter or the general laws of the state. The three electors and freeholders shall be appointed by the city commission for initial terms of one, two and three years, respectively, and thereafter for terms of three years each. The city assessor shall serve as a non-voting advisory member and as clerk of the board of review. The members of the board of review shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by the city commission.

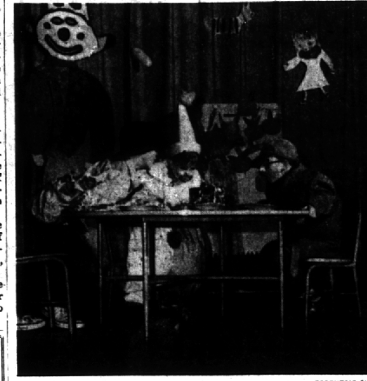
NOTICE IS FURTHER GIVEN, that said Sections 9 and 14 now read as follows:

Section 9. The commission shall whenever a vacancy occurs, appoint a clerk, a treasurer, an assessor, a health officer and a constable, and it shall annually appoint two members of the board of review. The manager may, with the advice and consent of the commission, appoint a city attorney, an engineer, a chief of police, a chief of fire department and any other officers for whose appointment provision shall be made in this charter, and provide for their powers and duties. Unless otherwise provided in this charter or by statute, all appointees of the commission shall hold office during the pleasure of the commission, and all other appointive officers shall hold office during the pleasure of the manager. One person may be appointed to two or more offices except that the offices of clerk and treasurer shall not be filled by the same person.

Section 14. The city assessor, and two qualified freeholders and electors of the city who shall be appointed by the city commission as hereinafter provided, shall constitute the board of review of the city in relation to assessments made for general taxation purposes, whether under the provisions of this charter or the general laws of the state. The members of the board of review shall receive such compensation as shall be fixed by the commission.
