## Rules Changed at Springdale

Playing rates at Birmingham's municipal golf course, Springdale, will generally remain the same this season; but several changes concerning course rules have been made.

City commissioners Monday night approved City Manager L. R. Gare's recommendation that no increase in rates at Springdale be put into effect this year except for a 25-cent raise in fees for non-residents playing nine holes.

The commission also approved a

rate schedule for the new course under construction at Lincoln and Cranbrook roads.

Gare said there is still a possibility that the new 9-hole course might open late this summer. Springdale officially opened this week.

UNDER THE new regulations, children under 10 will not be allowed to play on either Springdale or the new course.

The commission also approved a proposal by the administration to limit the number of guests a member may bring to Springdale to two.

guests should be limited because during the 1963 season several "unofficial" leagues had been operating in the late afternoon and were causing over-crowded conditions.

These leagues were composed primarily of nonresidents with only those residents in the league to qualify them to play," Gare said.

He noted that in some cases the ratio of residents to nonresidents appeared to be about 1 to 3, so that a 20-member league might have only 15 residents as actual members.

A PROPOSAL requiring golfers starting to play a second nine holes

to wait their turn instead of cutting into other foursomes was referred to the Springdale Advisory Board for further study.

Gare said he felt because Springdale was a nine-hole course it should be played as such and golfers wanting to play a second nine holes should be required to wait.

At the new course, rates will be \$1.25 for members on weekdays and \$1.75 for nine holes on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Guests will be charged \$1.50 for weekdays and \$2 for Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

THE HIGH rate for the new

course was needed because expenses in operating the facility will be higher than those at Springdale.

"Our expenses may run as much as 35 per cent higher due to the increased maintenance requirements brought about by the larger fairways, tees, greens and complete irrigation system," Gare said.

Since the new course will be better than Springdale, Gare said he felt the higher rate was justifiable.

### Zoning Issue As 4 Seek 2 Seats in Troy

A turnout of at least 35 per cent of Troy's 9,800 registered voters on Monday is predicted by City Clerk Lawson Lockhart. At stake are two three-year terms on the city commission and four candidates seeking them are David E. Grattop, former police chief; Clarence A. Fonesh; incumbent James P. Carey; and Ronald W. Rounsiville. Grattop, fired last year as police chief by City Manager David E. Freststone, and Fonesh led the two other contenders in the Feb. 17 primary.

SINCE THAT time the campaign has centered on one main issue—how the city's zoning plan fits the future development of the city.

Grattop and Fonesh favor the rezoning of property at Stephenson and Maple from industrial to commercial for a proposed \$1 million shopping center built around a K-Mart store.

Carey and Rounsiville oppose any deviation from the city's long-range master plan for what they feel would be a short-range gain. Grattop and Fonesh are being backed by former Commissioner Louis Yanich, while Carey and Rounsiville have the support of Mayor Robert J. Huber.
