

Set Dedication Ceremonies For Levey Jr.

Dedication ceremonies for the Glenn W. Levey Junior High School, Southfield, will be held Sunday at 3 p.m. in the school gym. The public is invited to attend.

The district's third junior high, built at a cost of \$1,426,000, is located at 23300 W. Nine Mile road, west of Telegraph, and is designed to serve 900 students. It opened last fall.

Gordon Henderson, president of the Southfield Board of Education, will accept the building from Alex Riebe of the architectural firm of Lane, Riebe, Weiland, who designed the school.

HIGHLIGHT of the program will be the presentation of a portrait of Mr. Levey, late assistant school superintendent, by Mrs. Leo Walton, president of Kiwanis queens, on behalf of her club. Mr. Levey was a charter member of the Southfield Kiwanis Club, and the wives' organization volunteered to have his portrait painted for the school named in his honor. Peter Cristiano will represent the Kiwanis Club at the dedication.

A World War I comrade of Mr. Levey, Harry Shoets, will present the school a flag in memory of his friend. They served together in the 801-35th Aero Squadron and survivors have held yearly reunions since the end of the war.

The Levey Junior High band, orchestra and chorus will offer musical selections during the program and Mrs. Ruth Levey will be an honored guest.

The Rev. Theodore Doane will ask the invocation and Rev. Father Francis X. Hoffer will offer the benediction. The Levey P.T.A. will provide refreshments and the event will end with a tour of the building.

Classroom wings extend from the core, one wing almost entirely devoted to general science and biology. Rooms are wired for television reception and a public address system.
